### NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGES

### REGULATIONS OF THE COMMERCIAL FISHERIES ENTRY COMMISSION

Notice is hereby given that the Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission under the authority vested by AS 16.43.110(a) and AS 16.43.250 (a), proposes to adopt regulations in Title 20 of the Alaska Administrative Code to implement AS 16.43.250 as follows:

20 AAC 05 is amended by adding a new section (20 AAC 05.651) to allow eligible applicants who fished as a gear operator pursuant to a partnership enterprise to obtain point awards despite the fact that the gear license or registration for the partnership's gear was held by another partner. Under the draft regulations, a person seeking points under the new section after first demonstrate to the Commission the existence of the partnership. Once the partnership is demonstrated, the Commission will proceed, under its adjudicatory hearing procedures, to apportion participation and investment points among the partners. The Commission will apportion the points equally among all partners unless it is found that a different allocation is appropriate. Income dependence and alternative occupation points will be awarded to each partner separately, without apportionment or reduction. If apportionment, the applicant has a point total at or above the issuance level, he or she will receive a permit. Any partner who has previously received a permit, but whose point total, after apportionment, is below issuance level, will not be permitted to retain the permit.

The regulations also amend 20 AAC 05.720 by adding new subsections (d) and (e) to provide that, as a condition of approval of a permanent transfer of an entry permit, a person must certify that no points awarded the transferor for that permit were not during the course of a partnership enterprise, if that certification cannot be made, the Commission will approve the transfer if an express and sufficient waiver of point claims from any partners who have not received a permit is provided by the transferor. This provision will apply until July 2, 1980. Emergency transfers under AS 16.43.180 may be approved to avoid hardships which may be caused by the suspension of a request for permanent transfer.

The purpose of the regulations is to meet the twin goals of the Commission as interpreted by the Alaska Supreme Court in "Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission v. Temelton One No. 1893" - that is, to determine which partner should receive a limited entry permit according to an actual analysis of the relative investment and participation of the partners, while at the same time avoiding a proliferation of gear.

Notice is also given that any person interested may present oral or written statements or arguments relevant to the action proposed at a hearing to be held at Courtroom A, State Court Building, 4th Street, Juneau, Alaska, at 1:00 o'clock p.m. on November 14, 1979. Written comments on the regulations may be sent to the Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission, Room 314, Goldstein Building, Pouch KB, Juneau, Alaska 99811. Written comments must be received by the Commission prior to November 30, 1979.

The Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission, upon its own motion or at the instance of any interested person, may, subsequent to the close of the hearing and the deadline for submission or written comments, adopt the proposals either substantially as described, or with amendments made in response to comments received, without further notice or may decide to take no action on the matter.

Sealed bids in single copy for furnishing all labor, materials and equipment, and performing all work on Project No. 14490, Huffman, Old Seward Highway and Diamond Boulevard, described herein, will be received until 3:00 p.m. prevailing time, October 25, 1979 in the Division Director's Office, Division of Highway Design and Construction, Island Center Building, Douglas Alaska.

This project will consist of resurfacing approximately 5.7 miles of roadway in Anchorage with hot asphalt pavement. The Contract Documents make provisions for an alternate bid item for rubberized asphalt pavement.

Principal items of work consist of the following: 1,730 tons of crushed aggregate base course; all required flagging; all required construction Engineering by the Contractor; all required painted traffic markings; and all required thermoplastic traffic markings; plus Alternate A: 11,650 tons of hot asphalt pavement; 915 tons of asphalt cement; and 2,200 tons of asphalt paving for patching and leveling; or Alternate B: 8,700 tons of hot asphalt pavement; 535 tons of asphalt cement; 3,300 tons of asphalt paving for patching and leveling; and 1,700 tons of rubberized asphalt pavement.

All work shall be completed in 90 calendar days. In accordance with requirements set forth by the "Federal Highway Administration", the following provisions are made a part of all advertisements for highway construction contracts:

"Bidders must submit certifications stating whether or not they intend to subcontract a portion of the work and, if so, that they have taken affirmative action to seek out and consider minority business enterprises as potential subcontractors. Alaska Native Claims Selection

This decision approves lands outside the State of Alaska National Monument for conveyance to Arctic Slope Regional Corporation in accordance with the "Statement of Principles", dated April 24, 1979, and the "Terms and Conditions for Land Exchanges and Resolution of Conveyancing Issues in Arctic Slope Region between the Department of the Interior and Arctic Slope Regional Corporation", dated June 29, 1979.

On November 11, 1974, and November 26, 1975, the Arctic Slope Regional Corporation filed selection applications F-19148-13; F-19148-14, F-19148-29 and F-19148-31, all as amended, under the provisions of Sec. 12(c) and Sec. 17(d)(2)(E) of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA) of December 18, 1971 (85 Stat. 688, 701, 709, 713 U.S.C. 1601, 1611(c), 1616 (1976)), for the surface and subsurface estates of the lands described herein.

At the time of selection, the lands herein were withdrawn by PLO 5396 and were available for identification for selection pursuant to Sec. 12(c) of the Arctic Slope Regional Corporation as provided by Sec. 17(d)(2)(E) of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act.

On November 16 and November 17, 1978, PLO's 5653 and 5654, withdrawing various lands in Alaska, were issued pursuant to Sec. 204(e) of the Federal Land Policy and Management Act (90 Stat. 2743, 2753). Among the Lands withdrawn was the Arctic Slope Regional Corporation which included lands selected by the Arctic Slope Regional Corporation.

Subsequently, on December 1, 1978, the Gates of the Arctic National Monument was established by Presidential Proclamation. Included in the Monument were lands selected by the Arctic Slope Regional Corporation.

In order to avoid further delay of Native conveyances and to resolve possible conflicts between the parties as to the legal significance of the identification for selection by Arctic Slope Regional Corporation of the lands herein, and to consolidate Federal and Native holdings of lands within and outside the National Monument, Arctic Slope Regional Corporation and the Secretary of the Interior agreed to an exchange of lands and interests in lands. Under the authority of Sec. 22(f) of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (85 Stat. 688, 714; 43 U.S.C. 1621(f) (1976)), as amended, the Arctic Slope Regional Corporation and the Secretary of the Interior entered into a "Statement of Principles" on April 24, 1979; and on June 29, 1979 a document entitled, "Terms and Conditions for Land Exchanges and Resolutions of Conveyancing Issues in Arctic Slope Region" ("Terms and Conditions") was executed. Pursuant to the above, PLO's 5653 and 5654 were modified by PLO 5677, signed August 15, 1979, to remove any bar to conveyance of the lands described herein.

These lands do not include any lawful interests perfected under or being maintained in compliance with acres.
