REJECTS BIDS

FAIRBANKS - In a second round of bidding on Bethel and Nome construction projects, the University of Alaska has received bids in line with funds available for the work. Initial bids on the projects were in excess of funds available and had to be rejected.

had to be rejected. The apparent low bidder on the Bethel **p**roject – a one-story building to house the new Kuskokwim Community Col-lege – was Pioneer Construction Co. of Bethel whose base bid was \$224,000.

Apparent low bidder on the Nome project – a one-story building for the university's Northwest Extension Center – was the Petersburg joint venture of Northland Construction and Douglas Weeks whose base bid was \$268,500.

was 5,268,500. Interested contractors were given floor plans and perfor-mance specifications for the two buildings and directed to design them. Under this "design and build" plan, they could bid on one or the other project or on both together on both together.

Northland/Weeks submitted a base bid of \$263,500 on the Bethel project and a bid of \$527,500 on both projects.

Wilson, Cange, Kubic of Anchorage bid \$316,200 and Toombs Construction of Fair-banks \$347,000 on the Bethel job. Toombs additionally bid \$307,680 on the Nome project and \$654,680 on both. All bids are now being eva-

luated by the university's Office of Planning and Institutional Studies. They were opened November 29.

Part 43h of Title 25 of the Code of Federal Regulations provides for the enrollment of the Natives. A main source of "other evidence satisfactory to the Secretary of the Interior" is the official enrollment which not only contains evidence of race but of residence (on the 1970 census date) as well. Subpart 2651.2 of Title 43 CFR contains the authority for the Director, Juneau Area Office, Bureau of Indian Affairs, to act for the Secretary of the Interior in the determination of the eligibility of Natives for land benefits under the Act. As of November 17, 1973, 43 Natives had been certified for enrollment in the Village of Unga. On August 16, 1973, a field investigation was completed of Unga and at that time inieteen Natives who use the village for a period of time in 1970 had been certified for enrollment to this village.
