After a summer tenure at the Anchorage Muscum, the exhibit will be divided into two parts and travel to rural Alaskan sites during the winter and spring and will be on exhibit at the University of Alaska Museum in Fairbanks during the summer of 1994. The exhibit will then again be divided into two parts and travel to more rural sites during the following winter and spring and will be at the State Museum in Juncau for the summer of 1995.
