

State Grants Totaling \$230,000 Will Go to 41 Villages

JUNEAU—State grants totaling \$230,000 will be awarded, beginning July 1, to 41 villages and small cities under the Alaska Rural Development Act, Governor William A. Egan said today.

The Governor said it is anticipated that an additional 25 to 30 villages will receive grants later during the 1971-72 fiscal year.

The Grant Program, started in 1959, provides financing for community-development and public works projects in rural areas and is funded entirely with state money.

"Since 1959, more than 500 grants have been made to villages and small cities," Governor Egan said. "I am gratified that we are able to continue at this pace our ambitious program of state aid to improve the lives of people in rural communities."

Communities receiving the grants are:

Atka, Buckland, Chevak, Chis-

tochina, Dillingham, Deering, Dot Lake, Elim, Gambell, Goodnews Bay, Huslia, Hydaburg, Kake, Kiana, Kipnuk, Kivalina, Klukwan, Kwigillingok, Levelok, Manakotak, Mentasta, Mountain Village, Nenana Native Village, New Stuyahok, Newtok, Noatak, Nondalton, Noorvik, Ouzinkie, Pelican, Pilot Station, Point Hope, Port Lions, Ruby, Savoonga, Saxman, Shageluk, Shishma-

ref, Stevens Village, Tetlin, and Wales.

Programs which the grants will pay for range from a project to check beach erosion at Deering to establishment of a Totem Park, which will include the World's Totem, at Kake.

Many of the projects, Governor Egan said, are aimed at improving health conditions in rural communities through upgrading of water supply and sewage disposal systems.

At Elim, on the west shore of the Seward Peninsula's Norton

Bay, a state grant will help pay for a sawmill operation for the cutting and selling of logs to build Bureau of Indian Affairs housing on the peninsula, for construction of cabins in the village, and for permanent staking of winter trails.

Sealed bids in single copy for furnishing all labor, materials, and equipment, and performing all work on Project F-021-2(7), Kenai Spur described herein, will be received until 2:00 p.m. prevailing time, July 22, 1971, in the Commissioner's Office, Department of Highways, Island Center Building, Douglas, Alaska.

This project will consist of grading, drainage, highway illumination, and hot bituminous pavement on 4.37 miles of roadway at Kenai, Alaska.

Principal items of work consist of the following: 122,500 cubic yards of Unclassified Excavation; 138,000 tons of Selected Materials; 45,600 tons of Crushed Aggregate Base; 60,000 tons of Subbase B; 17,600 tons of Hot Bituminous Pavement; 1,050 tons of 120-150 Penetration Asphalt Cement; 126 tons of MC-30 Liquid Asphalt; and 53 tons of CRS-2 Cationic Emulsion; 9,000 linear feet of Pipe Conduit ranging between 12" and 48" diameter; in addition alternative bids are listed for 1,560 linear feet of 18" Pipe Conduit, or Rail; 9,500 square yards of concrete Sidewalk, 19,400 linear feet of Type 2 Curb and Gutter; 1,031,000 square feet of Hydro-seeding Class II; and 1,031,000 square feet of Topsoil; Highway Lighting System Complete, lump sum, all required; and miscellaneous item of work.
