

'Crossroad in Time' to Be Heard Nationally

KUAC's award-winning series, Crossroad in Time, will be heard across the nation this fall on the National Educational Radio Network.

Word was received today (Friday) by KUAC from NERN which includes approximately 400 stations from Puerto Rico to Alaska.

Crossroad in Time, which was funded by one of the original Corporation for Public Broadcasting Sounds of Radio grants, recently was named a winner in the 1970 Alaska Press Club Competition as the Best Documentary.

A series of 13 half-hour programs, produced by KUAC and aired by the station last fall, Crossroad in Time documents important issues facing the Athabaskan Indians of Interior Alaska.

Interviews with Athabascans in many villages capture the sounds of rural Athabaskan life—a life that is in transition between traditional and modern ways.

KUAC, a National Public Radio member station located on

the University of Alaska campus in College, will make the Crossroad in Time series available to Alaskan stations. Interested stations should contact KUAC directly.

that Indian children have the same emotions and concerns as all children, as well as to correct long-held misconceptions and inaccuracies about American Indians written into children's

literature by non-Indians.

Mrs. Sneve has three children of her own and has been a teacher of English, music, speech and drama in public and Indian schools.
