### Bilingual grants small for Alaska

Grants totaling nearly \$70 million, including seven grants totaling 583,497 dollars for Alaska, have been awarded to 425 local school districts and one institution of higher education to operate bilingual education classroom demonstration projects, U.S. Commissioner of Education Edward Aguirre announced.

Aguirre announced.

Located in 41 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and four territories, the HEW's Office of Education are being conducted in 68 different languages during the 1976-77 school year. Last year, the projects were conducted in

41 languages.
A total of 177 projects are newly funded this year. All the new projects received multi-year funding and need not enter into competition for additional funds in subsequent years. Only 30 of the current continuation grants will terminate at the end of this terminate at the end of this fiscal year.

The demonstration projects are designed to meet the special educational needs of children aged 3 to 18 with limited English-speaking proficiency. They make use of two languages—English and the one the child -English and the one the child uses at home-to develop reading, writing, speaking, listening, and other academic skills. In and other academic skills. In this way, the child does not fall behind in subject areas while learning the English lan-

guage. The projects also focus on the history and culture associated with both languages.

Grantees must spend at least 15 percent of their award on auxiliary or supplementary training programs.

Funding is provided through

the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title VII, the Bilingual Education Act. Also supported are centers to develop and disseminate bilingual education materials, a variety of training programs, and a technical assistance program.

# Norton Sound health exec. thanks FAA

Federal Aviation Adminis-tration personnel at the Nome Flight Service Station have been commended for assistance "beyond the call of duty" at Nome Airport on November

30.
William R. Bookhout, an executive of the Norton Sound Health Corporation, formally thanked Federal personnel at the airport for assistance they gave after he landed his light aircraft in a 37 knot wind blowing at a sharp angle to the blowing at a sharp angle to the runway. Assistance was needed to keep the aircraft from veering off the runway.

Flight specialists Wendall assman and Jerry Naylor promptly recruited two other

pilots and the four were able to hold the aircraft steady and maneuver it a quarter of a mile to the parking area. Their prompt assistance averted a possible accident, Bookhout said.


