A record of earnings for the year before filing is needed in addition to other proofs, he said. For the person who works for someone else, the previous year's withholding statement can be used.

The self-employed person should submit the previous year's federal income tax return. For widow's applications, a marriage certificate, death certificate and possibly proof of divorce from a prior marriage may be needed.
For those applying for disability benefits details of work and earnings for the twelve months prior to the date of disability are needed. Very important also are the names and addresses of all doctors and hospitals which gave treatment to the disabled person.

Last, but far from least, the social security number, Brodigan continued. Anyone applying for any payment should bring in all any payment should bring in all

This would include the numbers for a husband, wife, or any children.

## Anti-hunters on 2nd Phase-

## National Advertising Designed to Scare Congress

Anti-hunting and animal protectionist groups have launched the second phase of a national newspaper advertising campaign
designed to frighten Congess designed to frighten Congress into enacting a law upholding their stated aim to stop all taking of whales, seals, sea otters, pola bears, and other marine mammals, according to the Wildlife Management Institute.

Their goal is contrary to what leading marine specialists advise is best for the animals, but that does not deter their emotional stand on this issue

Current targets for their ire are the Senate Committee on Commerce, chaired by Senator Warren G. Magnuson (Wash.) and its Subcommittee on Oceans and Atmosphere, headed by Senator Ernest F. Hollings (S.C.).

The anti-hunting and protec tionist associations are trying to force Magnuson and Hollings to report their bill. Their newspaper ads are stimulating a hưge volume of mail to sway the committee's decision.
Much of the mail is from persons seriously concerned about the future of marine mammals, but who have little actual understanding of the undesirable result their efforts may bring.

Oversimplifications, half truths, and misleading state ments are being used to encour age them to take action tha could be contrary to the well being of marine mammals

By use of the same tactics the protectionists succeeded in getting unwise provisions written into H.R. 10420 when it was voted on the House floor. They seek how to gain still more concessions in the Senate ver sion.

Leading wildlife experts and conservations have advised the Hollings subcommittee that the House-passed bill is seriously de ficient. Its greatest and least recognized weakness is its substirecognized weakness is its substi-
tution of emotion for proven tution of emotion for proven
scientific judgement in the manscientific judgement in the man
agement of marine mammals.
agement of marine mammals.
H.R. 10420 would forbid any
H.R. 10420 would forbid any
killing of marine mammals, except by special permit, for a period of five years. The Senate subcommittee is considering increasing the moratorium to 15 years.
Leading marine experts have told the House and Senate committees that a blanket mora torium is negative, that it could result in more harm than good.

Many of the animals are international in their movements and distribution, and the prohibition against taking the animals by Americans will have no effect whatsoever on other nations.
In fact, the State Depart In fact, the State Department testified that continued efforts to force a worldwide moratorium could sabotage rational efforts to establish needed and workable international agreements.

Some countries are increasing. ly dependent on marine mammals for food and U.S. blanket closures will have absolutely no effect on their take. Only international agreements can reduce and regulate such taking.

Experts are advising the House and Senate committees to authorize greatly expanded federal-state cooperative research, enforcement, land acquisition, and management programs for marine mammals.
H.R. 10420 virtually rules this out, choosing instead to exert federal preemption over all mafine mammals, even those most common to state waters. Federal agencies lack both personnel and equipment to do the job.
A bill introduced by Senator Ted Stevens (Alaska) S.3161, includes the protective measures recommended by marine experts and wildlife specialists.
It is receiving little attention, however due to the chaos genhowever due to the chaos gen-
erated by the emotional preerated by the emotional
ponents of total protection.

Everyone wants the mari

nammals protected from future harm. The real question is how it should be done - by emotional reaction which historically has failed or by scientific man-
agement that already has all marine mammal populations either under total protection stabilized, or increasing.

Senator Magnuson. Senator Hollings, and other members of the Senate and House are receiving many requests from conservationists that any legislation enacted assure that scientific effort will be focused on the animal's well-being.
