NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF EMERGENCY REGULATIONS DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE REGULATIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

As required by AS 44.62.250, notice is hereby-given that the State Board of Education has adopted emergency regulations in Title IV of the Alaska Administrative Code dealing with the Alaska School Activities Association. The regulations, which took effect on October 28, 1976, are summarized as follows:

1. 4AAC 06.110 is repealed.
2. A new section, 4AAC 06.120 is adopted which provides for the adoption by reference of the constitution and bylaws of the Alaska School Activities Association as the applicable rules for the administration and control of interscholastic activities in Alaska and for eligibility for participation in those activities.

Notice is also given that the State Board of Education proposes to adopt these regulations as permanent regulations pursuant to the procedures set out in AS 44.62, the Administrative Procedure Act. "The AFS students do get special travel rates to go back and visit their (host) families."
