argued from the very beginning that the Inupiat people have no rights." Lewis said.

Lewis listed six points which are the core of the Inupiat position that they have a right to sue for trespass damages. They

That aboriginal title is a rule of American common law, not just government policy;

-I Inder the doctrine of aboriginal title, Native people have exclusive right to the land;

-That Native title is not

dependant upon recognition;

That aboriginal title can only be terminated by a clear act of Congress:

-That Native occupancy rights are fully protected by the U.S. Constitution:

-That federal laws and federal court decisions involving Native land rights fully apply to Alaska.

Attorney Gantz, in his rebuttal to the Inupiat position, said it is still unclear if aboriginal title has ever really existed. "It always seemed to me that the term aboriginal title was used too loosely," he said.

Gantz said the defendants agree with the first three of Lewis' six points, but reject the others.

Several times during the hearing, Judge Fitzgerald interrupted attorneys to clarify their state-ments and question the course they were following in argument. One issue repeatedly raised was whether claims for damages to individuals could or should be separated from damages to the Arctic Slope people as a whole. Defendants generally concede the validity of individual claims of property damage. The Inupiat contend however that as a group they have been harmed.

Fitzgerald commented that the crucial questions in the case would be whether aboriginal title ever existed and what the intent of Congress was in passing the Statehood Act and the Land Claims Act.

Parties accused of trespass include Alyeska Pipeline Service Co., Wien Air Alaska, Frontier Rock and Sand, Inc., Puget Sound Tug and Barge Co., Mukluk Freight Lines, Parker Drilling Co., and Shell Oil Co. The remainder of the list is virtually a business directory of Alaskan companies major involved in petroleum exploration, drilling, construction and transportation.

The State of Alaska is named as a defendant because it authorized some of the alleged trespass activities through such mechanisms as the 1969 Prudhoe Bay oil lease sale.

The complaint filed by the government on behalf of the Inupiat charges that trespassers killed significant numbers of game animals and damaged hunting camps, caches and Eskimo graveyards.

The complaint also charges that in addition to taking "significant quantities" of valuable materials from the land, the trespassers "polluted water supplies and permanently despoiled many acres of the Arctic tundra, removed vast quantities of sand and gravel, and took large quantities of valuable

geologic and geophysical data."

Since the original trespass complaint was filed on October 7, 1975, hundreds of pages of documents have been filed by plaintiffs and defendants. The case has a whole filing drawer to itself at the clerk's office of the U.S. District Court in Anchor-

Among those many documents are answers to the trespass charges filed by the defendants. Although the answers differ slightly, they all express the same basic defenses:

-That the United States is not a trustee of the Eskimos and cannot bring suit for them;

-No attempt was made to-stop the trespass at the time it occurred;

-That money from the land claims act was payment for any damage that might have been

-That the Inupiat cannot claim damages to wildlife because they do not own or have the exclusive use of that wildlife;

-That any Native claims for land or damages were terminated by the land claims act, the Statehood Act, and possibly even by terms of the treaty that governed the sale of Alaska to the United States.

Some of the defendants also state that any entry they made onto the land was made in good faith because they were allowed to do so by federal and state officials. In some cases, defendants specifically deny any knowledge of acts that are charged against them.

It is not known at this time when Fitzgerald will rule on the motion to dismiss the case.
