

Olympics Queen Mary Keller Named Outstanding Teenager

JUNEAU—Mary April Keller, of Nome, today was named Outstanding Teenager of Alaska, Governor William A. Egan announced.

Miss Keller, 18, was selected for the honor by the Outstanding Teenagers of America organization, headquartered in Montgomery, Ala., and her trophy was being presented in Nome on behalf of Governor Egan by Robert Scott, the governor's special assistant there.

"Miss Keller richly deserves the honor being accorded her

by this prominent national organization," the governor said. "She displays the keen interest of an active citizen in what concerns her city and state."

Miss Keller belongs to the Alaska Federation of Natives, Arctic Native Brotherhood, and National Indian Youth Council. She was chosen Miss World Eskimo Olympics and as a contestant in the Miss National Congress of American Indians competition was named Miss Congeniality.

She has served two years as president of her high school's

Girls' Athletic Association, and is student council secretary, a member of the girls' basketball team, and a basketball cheer leader.

She was class treasurer and secretary of Future Business Leaders of America, was honored by the Society of Outstanding High School Students and named student of the month, and received awards in mathematics of 1970 and 1971.

Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. Lester Keller, of Nome.

Non-Residents Get Jobs— Two-thirds Eligible from South 48

Senator Ted Stevens, (R-Alaska), said today he is watching carefully to insure that Alaskans are given priority in federal seasonal jobs throughout the state.

Stevens had been told that Civil Service procedures have been amended to allow first consideration of residents for summer jobs in Alaska by Robert Hampton, Chairman of the U. S. Civil Service Commission.

At Stevens request, the Commission had looked into the situation and found an extreme-

ly high declination rate of non-residents.

Two-thirds of those eligibles who indicate a desire for summer federal employment in Alaska are residents of the South 48, many of the non-Alaskans eventually decline the actual job offer.

"Alaska has one of the highest rates of unemployment in the United States," Stevens said. "It does not seem equitable to hire non-residents to fill vacancies in Alaska when there are qualified residents available for these positions."

This project will consist of grading, drainage, and hot asphalt pavement on 5.4 miles of the Glenn Highway and construction of a 285 foot composite steel girder bridge across the Little Nelchina River. This project is located approximately 47 miles west of Glennallen, Alaska.
