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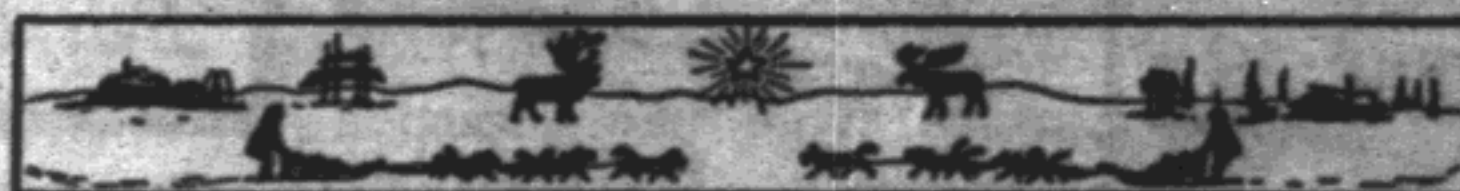

A physician who served
two other tours with the U.S.
Public Health Service in
Alaska is back on duty in the
Arctic and is located at
Kotzebue, the station he
requested.

Dr. Richard T. Light, who
served formerly at Barrow in
1962-63 and the Alaska
Native Medical Center in
Anchorage from 1963 to 1965,
is the new director of the
PHS hospital at Kotzebue
and its Service Unit.

With him are his wife,
Judith, and their three
children, the youngest two
of whom were born in Alaska.
The youngsters, ages 2, 4

and 6 respectively, are
Theodore, Timothy and
Martha Ann.

Dr. Light spent the inter-
vening two years at Vander-
bilt Hospital, Nashville,
Tennessee, in residency in
the field of general practice.
He was graduated from
Vanderbilt Medical School,
there, also and completed his
undergraduate work at
Earlham College in
Richmond, Indiana. He in-
terned at Cincinnati General
Hospital.

Dr. Light said he was
eager to return to the Arctic
Slope again. He arrived at
his new station only a week
before the visit of the
Surgeon General of the
United States Public Health
Service and other top PHS
officials.

He replaces Dr. Dudley
J. Weider who has gone to
Cleveland Clinic, Cleveland,
Ohio.

Joining the staff at
Kotzebue is Dr. Harry A.
Owens who has recently
completed his internship at
San Joaquin General Hospital
in California. He is a

furnishing all labor, materials, and
equipment, and performing all work
for Project F-FG-037-1(19),
Fairbanks-McKinley Park Highway,
25 Miles West of Ester to Tanana
River, described herein, will be
received until 11:00 a.m. PST,
August 24, 1967, in the Commis-
sioner's Office, Island Center
Building, Douglas, Alaska.
This project consists of grading
and drainage of 19.1 miles of road-
way near Nenana, Alaska.

Principal items of work consist
of the following: 1,152,000 cubic
yards of unclassified excavation;
317,400 cubic yards of borrow;
120,000 cubic yards of stripping
designated material sources; 210,700
cubic yard miles of overhaul;
166,300 tons of subbase, grading A;
approximately 10,700 linear feet of
pipe conduit ranging in size
between 18 inches and 48 inches in
diameter; 10,000 linear feet of
Beam Type Guard Rail; 636,000
square feet of Hay Seed Mulch; and
miscellaneous items of work.
All work shall be completed by
November 1, 1968.
