"It depends on where we've been before and how successful we've been," Wolfe explained about the stationing of attorneys.

Some villages, he said, have taken full advantage of ALS services and provide pressure to place full time lawyers in the village.

Chris Cook, formerly of Anchorage ALS heads the Bethel office and Ethan Windahl, a recent arrival in Alaska with an impressive background in corporate law heads the Nome office. Both will be aided soon, Wolfe expects, by VISTA attorneys assigned in Alaska for one year stints and lawyers on other fellowships or programs.

During his two years in Fairbanks, David Wolfe is perhaps best known for his handling of the 'TAPS case' - the case of Stevens Village, Minto, Allakaket and Bettles in a suit still pending against the Trans Alaska Pipeline.

"I will continue to be the attorney representing these villages," Wolfe explained, despite his move to ALS' offices in Anchorage as of October 1. He replaces executive director Phil Burns who will remain with the firm as a staff attorney specializing in trial cases.

Dickerson Reagan, who arrived September 1 from the Juneau ALS office replaces Wolfe as supervising attorney in Fairbanks.

Alaska Legal Services supplies legal aid to Alaskans unable to afford private lawyers. The firm, which includes about 20 staff lawyers, is supplemented by attorneys in VISTA and on special fellowships. It is governed
