

# Father Duncan's Cottage, Ft. William Seward Historic Places

Alaska's Technical Review Board for Historic Preservation recently approved nomination of two sites, Father Duncan's

cottage at Metlakatla and Fort William H. Seward at Haines, to the National Register of Historic Places.

Meeting at Sitka, the Board evaluated both sites for significance in local, state, or national history and present historical integrity.

Basis for the decision was information supplied by Mayor Solomon Guthrie of Metlakatla and Mr. Carl Heinmiller of Alaska Indian Arts, Inc. at Haines.

Formal nomination of the sites to the National Register will be made through Alaska's State Liaison Officer for Historic Preservation, Ted Smith, Director of the State Division of Parks.

If accepted by National Park Service officials for entry in the Register, the sites will be

afforded certain protection from encroachment by federally-funded or licensed programs and may be eligible for matching grants to restore the sites.

Egan said his administration must "come to terms with an overdue settlement of land claims. We must decide how the trans-Alaska pipeline can best be built. We must formulate a development plan for the North Slope. We must decide how best for Alaska to invest the state's revenues from its abundant resources."

Also sworn in Monday by State Supreme Court Chief Jus-

tice George F. Boney was Egan's lieutenant governor, H.A. "Red" Boucher. Egan succeeded Republican Governor Keith H. Miller, whom he defeated in the November election.

In one of his first acts as governor, the 56 year old Democrat victor named four commissioners and several assistants.

The four department heads named were Charles F. Herbert as Commissioner of Natural Resources, Kenneth W. Kadow as Commissioner of Commerce, Henry Benson as Commissioner of Labor and Emery W. Chapple, Jr. as Commissioner of Public Safety.

Richard Freer was named to act as Commissioner of Administration pending a permanent appointment.

Among the other appointees named were Byron Mallot and Eben Hopson of the Alaska Federation of Natives. Egan also announced the appointment of several deputy commissioners.

The governor, who served in his post during the first eight years of Alaska's statehood, began his political career in Alaska's territorial government.

Sealed bids in single copy for furnishing all labor, materials, and equipment, and performing all work on Project F-021-2(10), Turnagain Arm Crossing, Test Platform, described herein, will be received until 2:00 p.m. prevailing time, January 7, 1971 in the Commissioner's Office, Department of Highways, Island Center Building, Douglas, Alaska.

This project will consist of construction of a test platform in the waters of Turnagain Arm, located approximately 1/4 mile offshore and one mile south of Potter, Alaska.

Items of work will consist of the following: Structural Steel, furnished, fabricated, and erected, lump sum, all required; Pipe piles, furnished and driven, lump sum, all required, Rock core, 870 tons; Rock Blanket, 1,140 tons; and Armor Rock, 1,640 tons.
