Administration of Justice to Be Under Eye of Planning Council

JUNEAU—The adminis-
tration of justice in Alaska will
come under the watchful eye
of a new planning council
composed of both laymen and
lawmen as a result of a bill
signed into law last week by
Gov. Walter J. Hickel.

The measure, Senate Bill
253, establishes the
Governor's Planning Council
on the Administration of

Criminal Justice. It becomes
Chapter 83 of the Session
Laws of 1968.

The new law provides for
a council composed of the
attorney general, Edgar Paul
Boyko; the commissioners of
public safety, and health and
welfare, Mel J. Personett and
J. Scott McDonald, respect-
ively, and two laymen
appointed by the Governor.

As he signed the bill,
Hickel announced the
designation of Bill Kelly,
Anchorage radio and tele-
vision newsman, and Ed
Prince, Fairbanks business
executive, as the lay council
members.

Kelly has been very active,
both professionally and
personally, the Governor
said, in news coverage and
efforts to curb narcotics prob-
lems in Anchorage and
throughout Alaska.

Prince, manager of the
heavy equipment department
for Northern Commercial Co.
in Fairbanks, has been
active for many years in
civic affairs, particularly
those intended to provide
wholesome activities for

youth, including the Babe
Ruth baseball program.

As the Governor penned
his name to SB 253, he
commented, "It is par-
ticularly gratifying to see
this measure become law.

"It is imperative that
Alaskans — indeed all
Americans — begin to pay
more attention to efforts to
halt crime. We must concen-
trate on re-directing the
potential criminal before he
actually enters a life of
crime. Jobs and self-dignity
are the key.

"And we must continue to
work to contain and re-
habilitate the person already
involved in a lawless life."

Norris has been in Barrow
only a short time.

"He tries to see that the
natives become absorbed in
their work and accept re-
sponsibility," said Upicksoun.
"He has complete respect
of the natives with whom he
has worked. He has been a
good liaison man between the
BIA and the Barrow Utilities.

"I tell you one thing about
him. He knows how to
discipline the Eskimos."

Upicksoun said, however,
that Norris was leaving
Barrow soon to assume
assignment elsewhere and
the Barrow natives hated to
see him leave so soon.

Upicksoun is in charge of
vehicles and equipment at
the Barrow Utilities.

"I'm very happy with my
work," he said.

hunter, it's a full time job."

for furnishing all labor, equipment,
material and performing all work for
the construction of an Airport at
Grayling, Alaska.
