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Authentic Birch Bark Canoe Built

A birch bark canoe hadn't been built in Nenana since the early 1930's when Paul George's

early 1930's when Paul George's father built one as a toy.

From old photographs and recollections of David Esau, a Denai cargo canoe of traditional design was built this summer. The boat is entirely a product of Nenana and its surrounding woods. Every part is made with simple tools

simple tools.

The flat, interlocking bottom and notched gunwales bow and stern make it exactly like the stern make it exactly like the fishing canoes used on the Tanana and Lower Yukon Rivers. Several of these sturdy boats are pictured on a bank below Nenana in the Spring 1971 issue of ALASKA JOURNAL.

Just starting in Alaska is the SBA's 8 (a) program—an assistance program which helps native Alaskans start out in various contracting businesses. The first participant in the Alaskan native participant in the Alaskan program was Alaska Native Developers Incorporated, a firm coowned by Ralph Perdue and Jules Wright of Fairbanks.

Under the 8(a) program SBA helps the beginning firm negotiate one or more federal contracts. Any federal agency can set aside work for the 8(a) program which SBA then contracts for—and subcontracts to native contractors

They provide technical assistance during negotiations and some help—but this is assistance which diminishes each year and very soon the new company is going it on its own-but with experience and a reputation it did not have before.
"We certainly felt like we

earned it," says Jules Wright about the 8(a) contract his company is presently comple-ting with the Federal Aviation Agency. By completing the contract, he is being successfully established with a bonding company and will be able to become bonded to bid on larger pro-

jects than previously.
