# **Extensive Native Housing If Money Appropriated**

An extensive program of rural Native housing is in the works for Alaska this year if money already appropriated in Washington can be freed in time to start work this summer.

Last week, according to Sena-tor Mike Gravel (D-Alaska)'s office, the federal government approved the building of 1200 proved the building of 1200 houses, including water and sewage facilities, for rural villages in Alaska. The project, which is part of an 8,000 dwelling Housing and Urban Development Housing Program is by far the largest ever planned for Alaska.

Money for the housing has been designated for fiscal 1972, the government fiscal year which begins July of this year (1971). The problem which may arise

During the past week, Senator Gravel has sent letters and telegrams to village councils in Alaska, informing them of the project and asking for their help in his fight to obtain the housing

facilities as soon as possible. In his letter, he explains the project and that "the final decision on how much money will go into this project is up to the President." "I want to assure you," Sen-

ator Gravel writes to the village councils, "that I will continue to push for the money required.

Too often money which has been approved by the Congress for this sort of thing has been

held up by the administration."

The Senator asks village councils to read his letter at their council meeting and vote a reso

council meeting and vote a resolution, if they approve, in support of this program.
"If you will send these resolutions to me personally," he writes, "I will see that they are forwarded to the people who will make the decisions on where the housing will go." the housing will go."

The federal project, besides

being larger than any village housing project ever attempted before, will require an entirely new method of administration.

Some discussion has taken

place on asking the Alaska Federation of Natives to contract part of the necessary survey and supervisory work on the project. However, nothing definite has been planned, according to Senator Gravel's office.

Stevens, in testimony before the Senate Interior Appropriations Subcommittee, said the urgency of his request is emphasized by the fact the station has been only temporarily winter-ized and could become unusable if left vacant very long.
