

BLM Plotting Lands Withdrawn for Trans-Alaska Pipeline

FAIRBANKS — Bureau of Land Management employees here have begun plotting a description of lands withdrawn for

the trans-Alaska pipeline but do not know at this time the precise route the pipeline will take.

According to Mrs. Joyce Flesche, land supervisor with the BLM, the public land orders for land withdrawal spelled out in the federal register follow, in general, the proposed route for the pipeline.

But, in some instances, she said, the orders call for withdrawal of additional lands—some of which was previously selected by the State of Alaska, with ten-

tative approval.

She added, however, that the federal government's selection of additional lands is in line with the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act, which provided the Secretary of the Interior with the authority to make such withdrawals for the trans-Alaska pipeline corridor.

Land withdrawn for the utility and transportation corridor may not be selected either by the State of Alaska or by any

native group or regional or village corporation, under the provisions of the native claims settlement and the Alaska Statehood Act.

An exact picture of where the

official pipeline route will differ from the proposed route will have to wait until the exact descriptions of the land orders are plotted on a map, Mrs. Flesche said.
