Fairbanks District Office of the Bureau of Indian Affairs announced that 30,000 pounds of dog food for village was made available by the German Shepherd Club of the State of Washington.

The dog food is now being transported to villages by the BIA with the help from natives.

The 15 tons of dog food was transported from Seattle to Anchorage by the firm of SeaLand and stored by the Alaska Air National Guard in Anchorage.

Over the past several months, various villagers have asked for dog food totalling 70 tons.

Some village hunters hunted through the winter and were able to lower the amount of dog food required.
