

Alyeska Pays Spill Fine

JUNEAU — The State has received \$1,000 in compensation for environmental damage from Alyeska Pipeline Service Company for an oil spill which occurred on Feb. 21 at the company's Table Mountain radio communication station near Fairbanks.

Attorney General John Havelock said Alyeska was charged with violations of Alaska's environmental protection act after a chartered helicopter dropped a 500-gallon sealdrum loaded with fuel oil during a fuel delivery operation under adverse wind conditions.

The sealdrum — which is a sausage-shaped, heavy plastic container — burst upon impact with the ground, spilling about 400 gallons of fuel, Havelock said.

Dr. Max Brewer, environmental conservation commissioner, said Alyeska's Table Mountain

communication site receives fuel every three months and requires the use of helicopters to transport it because the site is not accessible by road.

The topics covered by the regulations are as follows:

Procedural regulations in the nature of a form and instructions to senior citizens which may be used in submitting application for a senior citizen's tax exemption.

The regulations deal with a definition of residence, gross income, and ownership interest, and explain who is eligible, how and to whom application shall be made, and how a decision adverse to the applicant may be appealed.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED ADOPTION OF REGULATIONS CONCERNING MUNICIPAL BOUNDARY CHANGES THROUGH LOCAL ACTION

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Local Boundary Commission of the state of Alaska, under authority vested in AS 44.19.260(a)(2), proposes to adopt regulations in Title 19 of the Alaska Administrative Code to implement AS 44.19.260 and AS 29.68.010(b). The proposed regulations relate to municipal boundary changes through local action and treat basically with the procedures to be followed therein. The topics covered by the regulations are as follows:

Title 19 is amended by addition of comprehensive procedures for municipal boundary changes initiated through local action. New regulations prescribe the procedures which must be followed in annexing or detaching territory from cities and organized boroughs, and include a definition of how and by whom a petition may be initiated, the form and contents of a petition, submission of the petition together with appropriate exhibits and supporting briefs, review of the petition by the assembly or council, adoption of a resolution of intention to annex or detach, requirement of submission of the proposal to the voters, the manner in which an election shall be conducted, adoption of an ordinance incorporating the proposed boundary change, and review of the procedures outlined by the Local Boundary Commission.

Notice is also given that any interested person may present oral or written statements or arguments relevant to the action proposed to be taken at a hearing of the Local Boundary Commission to be held at the Municipal Court Room, City Public Safety Building, Sixth & "C" Streets, Anchorage, Alaska, on Monday, December 4, 1972, at the hour of 8:00 p.m. Subsequent to the public hearing and after considering all aspects of the oral or written testimony brought before it, the Local Boundary Commission, upon its own motion, may adopt the above-proposed regulations substantially as proposed without further notice.
