Preservation of Totem Poles Stressed by

JUNEAU-Totem poles, one of Alaska's most distinctive and unique art objects, will get a second lease on life if plans formulated by the Alaskan Indian Arts Committee of the Alaska State Council on the Arts are funded.

Meeting in Juneau recently, the committee completed plans for the first phase of a project aimed at preserving poles throughout Southeastern Alaska.

First phase plans call for a complete survey of all totem pole sites an inventory of poles, partial poles and fragments of poles, and an

estimate of the best means of preserving the totems.

Research efforts will determine native ownership of the poles. In disputed ownership cases, the Alaska Native Brotherhood has been asked to act as referee.

Gov. Walter J. Hickel, who met with the committee, congratulated the members on their determination to save "Work in this the poles. long overdue," field is said: "Alaska's Hickel unique and beautiful totem poles are recognized as great work of art by museums and anthropologists all over the world.

"Some of the finest collections of Tlingit and Haida art and artifacts are in museums in Britain and Switzerland. It is time for Alaskans to buckle down and preserve what remains in their own state of the magnificent culture of our Southeastern Coastal Indians."

Participants in the meeting included Mary Hale, chairman of the Alaska State Council of the Arts; Carl Heinmiller, president of Alaska Indian Arts Inc.; Jane Wallen of the state museum; Dr. Erna Gunther of the University of Alaska: George Hall of the National Park Service; Dr.

Walter Soboleff, Grand President of the Alaska Native Brotherhood; George Rosig of the Forest Service; and representatives of the Bureau of Indian Affairs.


