## Hopeful Sign on Pipeline Construction—Gravel Cites Interior Statements

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Senator Mike Gravel today cited progress by the Interior Department in preparing the statements on the environmental impact of the proposed Alaskan Oil pipeline as a hopeful sign that construction on the pipeline will begin in the near future.

Gravel referred to several meetings which have taken place in Washington this week between members of the Alaska State Legislatures Pipeline Impact Committee and officials responsible for various studies on the impact the pipeline will have upon the environment of Alaska.

State Senator Chancy Croft (D-Anchorage) met today with Russell E. Train, Chairman of the President's Council on Environmental Quality to discuss the Trans Alaska Pipeline.

Croft, Chairman of the Alaska Legislature's Pipeline Impact Committee, attended the meeting arranged by Senator Mike Gravel (D-Alaska) in Train's office with representatives from

the offices of Congressman Begich (D-Alaska) and of Senator Gravel.

Mr. Train discussed the "decisional road map" that the pipeline permit must follow after the Interior Department issues its final Environmental Impact Statement on the pipeline application by Alyeska Pipeline Service Company.

Croft said, "My committee has been most anxious to clear up the procedural maze related to the pipeline."

State Senator Croft reported that Chairman Train could not yet predict what the Council will do or even if it will comment to the Interior Department or to the President once the Impact Statement is made public.

Chairman Train suggested that there still were a number of factors to be cleared up before the Council could make a judgment.

The meeting, which extended for an hour and forty-five minutes, went much longer than had been planned. Senator Gravel said today, "I am grateful for the time and attention Chairman Train gave to the group of Alaskans."

Gravel noted that Train cancelled his attendance at the formal welcome by President Nixon for President Tito at the White House to continue the discussion.
