## **Gravel Cites Interior Statements**

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Sena-tor Mike Gravel today cited pro-gress by the Interior Department in preparing the statements on the environmental impact of the proposed Alaskan Oil pipeline as a hopeful sign that construction on the pipeline will begin in the near future.

Gravel referred to several meetings which have taken place in Washington this week between members of the Alaska State Legislatures Pipeline Impact Committee and officials responsible for various studies on the impact the pipeline will have upon the environment of Alaska.

State Senator Chancy Croft State Senator Chancy Croft (D-Anchorage) met today with Russell E. Train, Chairman of the President's Council on Environmental Quality to discuss the Trans Alaska Pipeline.

Croft, Chairman of the Alaska Legislature's Pipeline Impact
