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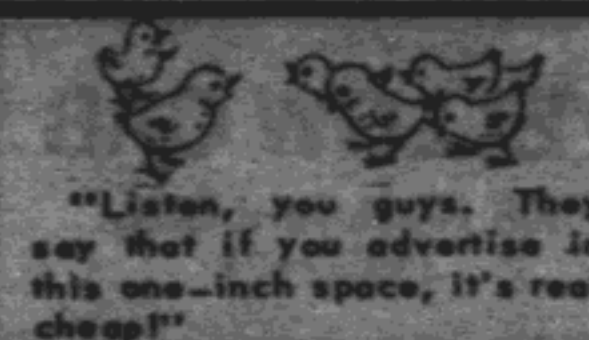

Sealed bids in single copy for furnishing all labor, equipment, and materials and performing all work for Project F-095-2(2), Front Street, Grant Street to Mission Street, Ketchikan, described herein, will be received until 11:00 a.m. Prevaling Time, May 28, 1968, in the Commissioner's Office, Department of Highways, Island Center Building, Douglas, Alaska.

This project consists of grading, drainage and concrete paving of 0.13 miles of Front Street in Ketchikan and construction of a 294 foot reinforced concrete viaduct. Principal items of work will consist of the following: Removal of Structures and Obstructions, all required; Concrete Pavement, 1,900 square yards; Class A Concrete, 550 cubic yards; Reinforcing Steel, 95,000 pounds; Welded Wire Fabric, 19,400 pounds; 32 Prestressed Concrete Beams; 560 linear feet of Aluminum Bridge Rolling; and miscellaneous items of work.

All work shall be completed by July 1, 1969.

Proposals will be received by the State of Alaska, Department of Public Works, Division of Water & Harbors, Pouch Z, Juneau, Alaska until 10:00 A.M. on May 22, 1968, for rental of earth moving equipment such as D-8 crawler tractors with scrapers or angle mounted blades, self-powered rubber tired scrapers, front end loaders or other suitable equipment that may be considered adequate to perform a sanitary land fill operation at Shungnak, Alaska.

These rates shall include operators' wages, together with fuel, lubrication, repairs, maintenance, insurance, taxes and other charges necessary to keep the equipment in good operating condition. Rentals will be paid for the period the equipment is actually working on the job site. Mobilization or demobilization costs, or any period of time lost or delays caused by breakdown or defective equipment will not be paid for by the State.
