## NORTH SLOPE BOROUGH

### NOTICE OF GENERAL ELECTION

1. Date of Election: October 5, 1976.
2. Time of Opening and Closing of the Polling Places: The polling places shall be open between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M.
3. Location of Precinct, Polling Places and Description of Voting Precincts by Boundary:

**ANAKTUVUK PASS PRECINCT.** Beginning at the peak of Soapak Mt.; thence southerly to the peak of Kollutuk Mt.; thence easterly to the peak of Three River Mt.; thence northerly to the peak of Mt. Stuver; thence westerly to the peak of Soapak Mt.; the Polling Place: School.

**BARROW PRECINCT.** Beginning at 150 west longitude and the boundary of the State of Alaska in the Arctic Ocean; thence southerly along 150 west longitude to its point of intersection with 68 north latitude; thence westerly along 68 north latitude to its point of intersection with a north-south line drawn through Point Franklin on the west; thence

northerly along a north-south line drawn through Point Franklin on the west to the boundary of the State of Alaska in the Arctic Ocean; thence easterly along the boundary of the State of Alaska to 150 west longitude; the point of beginning excluding Browerville and Anaktuvuk Pass Precincts. Polling Place: North Slope Borough Assembly Room.

**BARTER ISLAND PRECINCT.** That area beginning at a point on the international boundary between Alaska and the Dominion of Canada and the intersection of the boundary of the North Slope Borough; thence northerly along the boundary common to the State of Alaska

and Canada to the northernmost boundary of the State of Alaska; thence meandering westerly to its intersection with 150 west longitude; thence southerly along 150 west longitude to its intersection with 68 north latitude; thence easterly along 68 north latitude to its intersection with 146 west longitude; thence northerly along the 146 west longitude line to its intersection with 68 30' northerly latitude line to the easterly boundary of the State of Alaska on the interna-

tional Boundary, the point of beginning. Polling Place: BIA School.

**BROWERVILLE PRECINCT.** Beginning where the outlet of Tasigrook Lagoon empties into the Arctic Ocean; thence upstream in the center of said outlet to Tasigrook Lagoon; thence along the south side of said lagoon and the southerly side of Isatkoak Lagoon to the most southerly point; thence due east to Elison Lagoon. The precinct includes Doctor Island, Deadmans Island, the DEW Line installation, Arctic Research Laboratory and the International Telephone and the Telegraph site.

Polling Place: Arnold Brower, Jr. **NUISQUT PRECINCT.** Beginning at 150 59' 36" west longitude and 70 12' 30" north latitude at the south bank of Nuchelik Channel thence meandering southerly along the bluff for approximately one mile thence westerly, northerly and easterly to the point of beginning to include all of that new townsite of Nuiqsut. Polling Place: Nuiqsut Health Center.

**POINT HOPE PRECINCT.** All of the area draining into the Arctic Ocean from Cape Thompson to Cape Lisbourne, including the military site. Polling Place: Tigara Hall.

**POINT LAY PRECINCT.** Beginning at 162 57' 30" west longitude and 69 45' 10" north latitude to include the new and old townsites of Pt. Lay and Kakwik River Delta. Polling Place: Amos Agnasagga's.

**WAINWRIGHT PRECINCT.** All of the area draining into the Arctic Ocean from Cape Lisbourne on the west to the north-south line drawn through Pt. Franklin on the east. Polling Place: National Guard Armory.

#### The qualifications of voters:

- A person may vote who:
- (1) is a citizen of the United States, qualified to vote in the State of Alaska elections;
  - (2) has been a resident of North Slope Borough for 30 days immediately preceding the date of the election;
  - (3) is registered to vote in State of Alaska elections;
  - (4) is not disqualified under Article of the Constitution of State of Alaska.

5. The type of election, general or special: The election is a general election.

6. The propositions submitted to the electors are:

- a. The following seats are open in the North Slope Borough government for election:

Two (2) Assembly seats of the North Slope Borough Assembly.

b. Shall the North Slope Borough, Alaska, issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed the sum of TEN MILLION DOLLARS (\$10,000,000) for the purpose of financing the cost, in whole or in part, of the construction, improvement, betterment, repair, reconstruction, or acquisition of schools in said borough, together with all necessary appurtenances, equipment, furnishings and facilities, and the acquisition of lands or rights in lands in connection therewith, in accordance with and ratifying and approving the provisions of Ordinance Number of the North Slope Borough adopted by the Borough Assembly on August 3, 1976.

c. Shall the North Slope Borough, Alaska, issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed the sum of TEN MILLION SIX HUNDRED SIXTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$10,665,000) for the purpose of financing the cost, in whole or in part, of the construction, improvement, betterment, repair, reconstruction, or acquisition of public roads, streets and sidewalks in said borough, together with all appurtenances, equipment, and facilities necessary for the construction, repair and maintenance of roads, streets and sidewalks, and the acquisition of lands or rights in lands in connection therewith, in accordance with and approving the provisions of Ordinance Number 76-18 of the North Slope Borough adopted by the Borough Assembly on August 3, 1976.

d. Shall the North Slope Borough, Alaska, issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed the sum of SIX HUNDRED THIRTY-SEVEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$67,000) for the purpose of financing the cost, in whole or in part, of the construction, improvement, betterment, repair, reconstruction, or acquisition of airports and aviation facilities in said borough, together with all necessary appurtenances, equipment, furnishings and facilities, and the acquisition of lands or rights in lands in connection therewith, in accordance with and approving the provisions of Ordinance Number 76-19 of the North Slope Borough adopted by the Borough Assembly on August 3, 1976.

e. Shall the North Slope Borough, Alaska, issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed the sum of EIGHT HUNDRED THIRTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$830,000) for the purpose of financing the cost, in whole or in part, of the construction, improvement, betterment, repair, reconstruction, or acquisition of public housing and urban renewal rehabilitation and development in said borough, together with all necessary appurtenances, equipment, furnishings and facilities, and the acquisition of lands or rights in lands in connection therewith, in accordance with and ratifying and approving the provisions of Ordinance Number 76-20 of the North Slope Borough adopted by the Borough Assembly on August 3, 1976.

f. Shall the North Slope Borough, Alaska, issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed the sum of FOUR MILLION ONE HUNDRED THIRTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$4,113,000) for the purpose of financing the cost, in whole or in part, of the construction, improvement, betterment, repair, reconstruction, or acquisition of light power and heat systems in said borough, together with all necessary appurtenances, equipment, furnishings and facilities, and the acquisition of lands or rights in lands in connection therewith, in accordance with and ratifying and approving the provisions of Ordinance Number 76-21 of the North Slope Borough adopted by the Borough Assembly on August 3, 1976.

g. Shall the North Slope Borough, Alaska, issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed the sum of ONE HUNDRED TWENTY-SEVEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$127,000) for the purpose of financing the cost, in whole or in part, of the construction, improvement, betterment, repair, reconstruction, or acquisition of public safety facilities in said borough, together with all necessary appurtenances, equipment, furnishings, and facilities, and the acquisition of lands or rights in lands in connection therewith, in accordance with and ratifying and approving the provisions of Ordinance Number 76-22 of the North Slope Borough adopted by the Borough Assembly on August 3, 1976.

h. Shall the North Slope Borough, Alaska, issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed the sum of FIVE HUNDRED FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$540,000) for the purpose of financing the cost, in whole or in part, of the construction improvement, betterment, repair, reconstruction, or acquisition of telephone facilities in said borough, together with

i. Shall the North Slope Borough, Alaska, issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed the sum of TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$270,000) for the purpose of financing the cost, in whole or in part, of the construction, improvement, betterment, repair, reconstruction, or acquisition of sanitary facilities in said borough, together with all necessary appurtenances, equipment, furnishings and facilities, and the acquisition of lands or rights in lands in connection therewith, in accordance with and ratifying and approving the provisions of Ordinance Number 76-23 of the North Slope Borough adopted by the Borough Assembly on September, 1976.

k. Shall the North Slope Borough, Alaska, issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed the sum of TWO HUNDRED THIRTY-SIX THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$236,000) for the purpose of financing the cost, in whole or in part, of the construction, improvement, betterment, repair, reconstruction, or acquisition of water facilities, and the acquisition of lands or rights in lands in connection therewith, in accordance with and ratifying and approving the provisions of Ordinance Number 76-25 of the North Slope Borough adopted by the Borough Assembly on August 3, 1976.

l. Shall the North Slope Borough, Alaska, issue its general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed the sum of TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$270,000) for the purpose of financing the cost, in whole or in part, of the construction, improvement, betterment, repair, reconstruction, or acquisition of sanitary facilities in said borough, together with all necessary appurtenances, equipment, furnishings and facilities, and the acquisition of lands or rights in lands in connection therewith, in accordance with and ratifying and approving the provisions of Ordinance Number 76-26 of the North Slope Borough adopted by the Borough Assembly on September, 1976.

## NEWS BRIEFS ...

**BEACH GOLD MINING** is now back in business in Nome with the advent of a \$250,000 sophisticated sluice box on wheels which requires three people to operate it and stands 20 feet tall. The machine was conceived by former Anchorage mayor, Ken Hinchey, who says the machine will mine an area 1,000 feet square from the beach line out into five feet of water. He predicts it will bring in gold valued between \$5 and \$10 per cubic yard of processed sand. To attract financing, Hinchey is counting on mining at least a half million dollar load by freeze-up.

**THE ALASKA FEDERATION OF NATIVES/United Bank of Alaska's women's B Division slow-pitch softball team won every game in the recent 17-team tournament to capture the state title. Second was a team from Valdez and third was the Columbia Mobile Homes team from Fairbanks.**

**THE BETHEL-BASED Calista Corporation has applied for a municipal government permit for foundation work on their \$24 million hotel complex in downtown Anchorage. The hotel is to be managed by the Sheraton Corp. and will be built on the Calista-owned city block between Fifth and Sixth avenues and Denali and Eagle Streets.**

**32 MILLION ACRES of Alaska's land, proposed for national parks three years ago as part of the federal government's planned withdrawal of**

**83 million acres under section 17 D-2 of ANSCA, were definitely included in a proposed expansion of the federal park system announced by President Ford last week. The plan which called for a \$1.5 billion Congressional appropriation, brought charges of hypocrisy and political maneuvering for election purposes from Democratic Senator J. Bennett Johnston of Louisiana.**

**ON SEPT. 1, an Alaskan Superior Court judge ruled against Governor Jay Hammond's recent veto of nearly \$3 million from a \$7.1 million bond authorization bill for construction of fire-fighter training centers around the state. Compton ruled that the item veto was unconstitutional because the bond package was not an appropriation bill. The case had been initiated by Hammond himself to test the legality of his controversial line-item vetoes of more than \$44 million from bonds to appear on the November ballot—a move highly criticized by some, like the city of Bethel, who say those cuts were unfair to the bush. Last week's decision was immediately appealed, and due to the fast-approaching election, the State Supreme Court has been asked for a speedy hearing.**

too?"

Ketzler believes that the villages don't really know what the situation is and would rather not have to make decisions. He admits, "They're not that happy with us because we don't have the resources to get out to them. But they would rather have us than the bureau."

Questioning why TCC cannot charge a management fee or attain a surplus of capital under self-determination contracts, Ketzler says he's always operating in an overdrawn situation at the bank which forces him to terminate staff until he can

negotiate contracts he can survive on.

Some of the major underlying problems now, Ketzler feels, are the agencies' fear of being phased out and the policy differences between the regions themselves, as in the case of AVCP and TCC methods of gathering village approvals for contracts.

Still, even with all its troubles, self-determination is a good thing, says Al Ketzler. "But the way it is now, the agencies have to be made to understand that it's not another regulation to use to harass us."
