The case had been initiated by Hammond himself to test the legality of his controversial line-item vetoes of more than line-item vetoes of more than \$44 million from bonds to appear on the November ballot—a move highly criticized by some, like the city of Bethel, who say those cuts were unfair to the bush. Last were unfair to the bush. Last week's decision was immediately appealed, and due to the fast-approaching election, the State Supreme Court has been asked for a speedy hearing.
