The students' course work is to include basic mathematics, drafting, general geology, english, science, mining and prospecting, surveying, milling mineralogy.

The program is designed to give the students a basic knowledge of terms and procedures and to teach them the skills needed for placement with mining and petroleum firms.

The governor said Parco Inc. has agreed to cooperate in the program by accepting, during the next few months, the six available trainees from the class which completed the university course last month.
