Funds restored for Aleutian schools

JUNEAU - Funds for Aleutian Chain schools that were stricken from the legislature's bonding proposal have been restored through the action of District 15's representative Alvin

Under a compromise redrafting of the bill (Senate Bill 564) that was recently reached by the House Finance Committee, Aleutian Chain communities will be included in the nearly \$60 million bond package to be offered to Alaskan voters this

The communities and their amounts are: King Cove, \$576, 000; St. George, \$432,000; Old Harbor and Port Lyons, \$1,200,000 each; and St. Paul, \$720,000.

In the previous, apparently final version of the bill, only King Cove and Old Harbor had been allotted funds, to a total of \$1,850,000. The current bonding allotments total \$4,128,000 for District 15.


