

Parr submits amended bonding proposal for statewide corrections

JUNEAU — Juveniles awaiting placement in foster homes no longer be committed to jail if an amended bonding proposal for statewide corrections is approved.

The House Committee on Health, Education and Social Services recently approved a move by Fairbanks Rep. Charles Parr to change planned juvenile facilities in Fairbanks, Ketchikan and Juneau to allow for a gradation of confinement. House Bill 618 had called for construction of conventional lock-up

detention centers for youths in those cities.

But up to half of the juveniles currently under court supervision in Fairbanks have committed minor infractions or no offenses at all. "We've had children as young as 10 years old in jail in past years," Parr pointed out. Anything from running away from home or truancy to need for parental supervision can land a child in jail in Fairbanks today.

Parr called this temporary jail commitment "a shameful

practice" and several weeks ago called for postponement of action on the bonding proposal to allow further investigation.

In the interim he met in Fairbanks with Judge Art Robson, juvenile intake officer Pat Aloia and architect Jerry Meyers, and recently presented a proposal that the new \$1.8 million facility in Fairbanks be built to contain 30 residents — half under confinement, half not confined.

The youth facility is part of \$3.6 million in correctional funds for Fairbanks. If approved by the legislature, the bonding proposal will go before Alaskan voters this fall.

Fairbanks Superior Court figures show that during 1975, 1,547 juveniles — 1,080 male, 467 female — were detained in the Fairbanks jail. Of these the majority (approximately 80%) were released with no formal action — either by referral to a social-service agency or with a verbal warning in conference with the parents.

The juveniles were detained on matters ranging from discharge of fireworks and littering to shoplifting and burglary. Drug violations and lar-

ceny make up the major types of serious offenses by males; female juveniles are most often confined for running away from home.

"We are derelict in not doing something about this situation," Parr contends. "This is my first opportunity to try to change this practice and I have seized it."

In addition to including the youth facilities on the bonding proposals, Parr indicated, "The HESS committee is specifying that the Department of Health

and Social Services must consult with local citizens and fit the design of the facility to the local program for handling children in trouble with the law — or just in trouble."

The bill goes now to the House Finance Committee for consideration.

RCA installs computer Telex Exchange in Anchorage

Anchorage—RCA Alaska Communications, Inc., has installed a new Computer Telex Exchange in Anchorage which will greatly increase telex capacity and improve service to existing customers.

The digital computer, manufactured by Frederick Electronics, increases the number of telex circuits between Anchorage and Fairbanks, Juneau and the Lower 48. The new exchange can be easily expanded to meet future needs for telex, which is among the fastest growing services offered by Alascom.

Telex service enables Alaska customers to send written messages to any other telex customer by dialing or keying in a number. The service costs less than a long distance telephone call and provides the user with a written record. Telex service is offered worldwide. Currently,

there are nearly 800 telex customers in Alaska.

The new exchange replaces a Siemens Electromechanical Telex Exchange which had reached its full capacity. The electromechanical equipment will be put into service this summer in Fairbanks and Juneau to relieve shortages of capacity and permit new telex installations in those cities and their tributaries.

In Alaska, telex service can be offered wherever there are available telegraph channels. Public telex service is available at Alascom public service counters in Fairbanks, Anchorage and Juneau.

Alascom's new telex computer is of the most advance design available and provides customers with a wide range of features. Frederick Electronics has about 40 such systems in operation in various parts of the world.

Hatchery Permit Issued

JUNEAU—The Commissioner of Fish and Game, Jim Brooks, today issued a private nonprofit salmon hatchery permit to Alaska Aquaculture Foundation of Wrangell for the outlet stream from Burnett Lake on Etolin Island.

The proposed hatchery will have an ultimate capacity of 10 million pink and chum salmon eggs combined. Returns of adults to this facility should complement the natural production of the area, according to Brooks.

This permit is the fifth to be issued by the department since the Alaska State legislature authorized the operation of private nonprofit salmon

hatcheries in 1974. Two private hatcheries operated last winter.

Sheldon Jackson College began releasing approximately 2 million pink salmon fry in late March. The Prince William Sound Aquaculture Foundation anticipates the release of about 3 million pink fry during May.

In addition to the Department of Fish and Game permit to obtain and incubate the salmon eggs and release the fry, private hatchery operators must obtain permits from other state and federal agencies regarding land use, water use, waste discharge, and structures in navigable waters before actual hatchery operations can begin.

As required by AS 44.62.250, notice is given that the Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission, on May 17, 1976, adopted the following emergency amendment to 20 AAC 05.510 (b) relating to the time of application for entry permits for those fisheries for which entry permits are required for the first time in 1976. The new language of the regulation is underlined and the regulation now reads as follows:

20AAC 05.510. TIME OF APPLICATION.
(b) The application period for entry permits for those fisheries designated in sec. 310 (a)(9)-(13) of this chapter will be from March 10, 1976, until midnight, June 10, 1976. (Eff. 12/18/74, Reg. 52: am / / Reg)

NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE REGULATIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE ALASKA TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION

Notice is hereby given that the Department of Commerce, Alaska Transportation Commission, under authority vested by AS 42.07.141(a) and (b), proposes to amend regulations in Title 3 of the Alaska Administrative Code to implement AS 42.07.121, AS 02.05, AS 42.15, AS 42.25 and AS 42.10 as follows:

3 AAC Chapter 60 is amended by adding a new Article 6 Section 640 through 710.

Modified Procedure a new regulation under the Rules of Practice and Procedure.

This new regulation will permit a party to request that Modified Procedure be utilized by simply making the request with his application, complaint or petition.

Additionally, the Commission, on its own initiative may order any case be handled by modified procedure.

The procedure calls for the presentation of evidence and arguments in the form of "briefs" to be submitted according to a timetable as set out in the Modified Procedure Rules.

The Rules provide that modified procedure is initiated by an order directing modified procedure. The regulation will amend Chapter 60 by adding a new Article 6, Section 640 through 710.

Copies of the Proposed Regulation are available at the office of the Alaska Transportation Commission.

Notice is also given that any person interested may on or before June 7, 1976 file written arguments or statements relevant to the action proposed herein above or may appear and offer oral or written arguments or other statements at a hearing to be held June 7, 1976, at the hour of 10:00 A.M., in the Alaska Transportation Commission's Hearing Room, 10th Floor MacKay Building, 338 Denali Street, Anchorage, Alaska 99501.

This project will consist of grading, drainage and aggregate surfacing along 8.6 miles of road near Iliamna, Alaska.
