Such games were played at the indoor Eskimo games-hand wrestling, arm pull, finger pull, broom pull, also jumping.

January 1. Indoor games were played with Charles Christensen, the principal teacher, and Jerry Fuller, the VISTA, as captains, white men's games were played. And it turned otu to be a most interesting evening.

In the Eskimo games, the high kick was not played. And Walter Weyapuk, the local postmaster, the unequaled high kick jumper, was not given a chance to jump again.

In the women's games, a broad jump, that is one big hop from standing, was won by Jane Oxereak with 5 foot, 11 inches. Seconded by Shirley Anagazuk short 2 inches.

The indoor Eskimo games played were by the local school board and captained by the members. One of the members, Roland Angnaboogok, was not in.

And speaking of Roy Okpealuk's team winning in the indoor Eskimo games. (He does not participate much. All he does is holler and fuss at his team all evening. No wonder his team won.)


