#### OPEN SEASON FOR SUBMITTAL OF APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS FROM THE INDIAN BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT FUND

Department of the Interior  
Bureau of Indian Affairs

Application for grants from the Indian Business Development fund for Alaska Natives for projects on or near their reservations or village are to be filled with the superintendent of the agency whose territory within which the applicant lives. Applications from members of other tribes or villages or for projects involving other reservations or villages may be filed with the Area Director, Juneau Area Office, P.O. Box 3-8000, Juneau, Alaska 99801.

The Indian Business Development Fund is a supplemental grant program to increase Indian Entrepreneurship, Indian Employment and Indian income. Indian individuals, groups of Indian individuals, Indian villages, Indian tribes or Indian corporations may apply for a grant.

Projects must be located within the State of Alaska. Projects must be profit oriented or self-sustaining. The grant may only be made as a supplement to other financing. Grants may not be made as a supplement to other financing. Grants may not be used for refinancing or debt consolidation. Sealed bids in single copy for furnishing all labor, equipment, and materials, and performing all work on Project S-0131 (16), Nome-Teller Road, Bluestone to Teller, described herein, will be received until 2:00 p.m. prevailing time, October 22, 1970, in the Commissioner's Office, Department of Highways, Island Center Building, Douglas, Alaska.  
This project will consist of reconditioning the existing roadway and placing subbase material for 13.4 miles. The project is located approximately 60 miles northerly of Nome, Alaska.

Principal items of work consist of the following: 5,100 cubic yards of borrow; 707 stations of Reconditioning; 68,200 tons of Subbase, Grading A; 4,200 linear feet of Snow Fence; and miscellaneous items of work.  
All work shall be completed by October 1, 1971.
