27 acres of clearing and grubbing 203,000 cubic yards of common excuvation and 271,000 cubic yards of muck excavation; 568,000 cubic yards of selected material; 20,300 cubid yards of crushed aggregate base; 22 800 cubic yards of sub-base, 15,000 tons of hot bituminous pavement. 115 tons of MC-30 liquid asphalt 1,600 linear feet of 18" reinforced concrete pipe; 1,300 linear feet of 24" pipe conduit; 19,500 linear feet of 6' chain link fence; 12,300 linear feet of curb and gutter, type 2: 1,075,000 square feet of seeding and topsoil; illumination and traffic signal systems complete; and miscellaneous items of work.
