This project will consist of intersection reconstruction at three locations, including the installation of one intersection signal system and one flashing beacon system.

Principal items of work consist of the following: 378 linear feet of standard curb and gutter; 326 linear feet and gutter removal; 136 square feet of standard signs. Lump sum items include: pavement construction, traffic signal system complete, flashing beacon system complete, highway lighting system complete, and painted traffic markings.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE REGULATIONS OF THE ALASKA BOARD OF FISHERIES AND BOARD OF GAME

Pursuant to the Administrative Procedures Act, Alaska Statutes 44.62, notice is hereby given that the Alaska Board of Fisheries and the Alaska Board of Game, under authority vested by Alaska Statutes 16.05.260, propose to adopt, amend or repeal regulations contained in Part 7 of Title 5 of the Alaska Administrative Code concerning Fish and Game Advisory Committees which implement, interpret and make specific the provisions of Title 16, Alaska Statutes.

The Board of Fisheries and the Board of Game will adopt, amend, repeal or take no action on the proposed changes in regulations as listed in the following informative summary:

CHAPTER 96. FISH AND GAME ADVISORY COMMITTEES
1. ESTABLISHMENT 5 AAC 96.010.

Is amended with regard to geographic areas of jurisdiction for advisory committees and appointment of committee membership.

2. COMPOSITION OF COMMITTEES 5 AAC 96.020.

Is amended with regard to committee representation.

3. QUALIFICATION OF MEMBERS 5 AAC 96.022.

New section regarding committee membership qualifications.

4. DELEGATION OF POWERS TO COMMITTEES 5 AAC 96.025.

New section conferring authority:

(a) for establishment of subsistence use areas upon local advisory committees.

(b) for limitation of access to certain areas upon local advisory committees.

(c) for openings and closures of seasons upon local advisory committees in specified areas and for specified purposes.

(d) upon local advisory committees for specification of hunting seasons by species and sex.

(e) upon local advisory committees to promulgate seasons solely for subsistence use in emergency situations and under specified conditions.

5. REPORT OF ACTIVITIES 5 AAC 96.030.

(a) Relaxes annual reporting requirements on condition that meeting minutes are regularly provided to the boards.

(b) Alters filing of all minutes with representative of the boards.

(c) Requires reporting of expenses as a condition to reimbursement and provides criteria.

6. ADOPTION OF UNIFORM BYLAWS 5 AAC 96.050.

Amends the following bylaws: Number 2. Purposes

Clarifies intent.

Number 3. Title and Advisory

Jurisdiction

Provides for specific geographic jurisdiction.

Number 4. Membership

Provides for committee establishment and membership maintenance by joint action of Board of Fisheries and Board of Game.

Number 5. Terms of Members

(a) Provides for membership terms to be determined by joint action of Board of Fisheries and Board of Game.

(b) Provides for an alternate system of membership replacement.

(c) Provides for standard membership terms.

Number 6. Vacancies

(a) Brings this bylaw into conformity with proposed provision that membership vacancies be filled by appointment by the joint boards.

(b) Provides for voluntary committee dissolution.

Number 7. Nominations

Provides that nominations for committee membership be made to the joint boards and that such nominations may be accompanied by recommendations.

Number 8. Terms of Officers

Allows officers whose terms have expired to preside through an election at the earliest subsequent regular meeting and to allow members with unexpired terms of less than 2 years to serve as officers.

Number 14. Meetings

Provides for a regular and more frequent schedule of meetings.

Number 15. Public Hearings

Requires public hearings at least twice yearly.

Number 16. Public Proceedings.

Lists methods and means of improving advertising of meetings and hearings.

Copies of the proposed changes in regulations summarized in this notice may be inspected at any Department of Fish and Game regional office or may be obtained upon request by writing to the Commissioner of Fish and Game, Support Building, Juneau, Alaska 99801.

Notice is given that any person interested may present oral or written statements or arguments relevant to the permanent adoption of such regulations prior to the close of a public hearing to be held at the International Inn, Anchorage, Alaska beginning at 1:00 p.m. March 31, 1976, or mailed to the Boards of Fisheries and Game, Support Building, Juneau, Alaska 99801 and received before 4:30 p.m. March 19, 1976. The Boards may thereafter adopt, amend, repeal or take no action on the proposed changes in the regulations without further notice.

\$1.5 million for Bethel hospital

WASHINGTON - A Senate resolution to free \$1.5 million for the Indian Health Service hospital complex at Bethel has been cleared by the Senate Appropriations Committee for action by the full Senate.

Sen. Mike Gravel, D-Alaska, joined in introducing the resolution to overturn the President's action in January so the money would be available this spring to complete the architectural design documents and install the pile foundation.

Gravel said deferral of the funds because the total estimated amount had not been appropriated in one lump sum "indicates a lack of understanding, both of the construction process and the urgent need for these Indian health facilities."

The Alaska lawmaker joined Sen. Hubert Humphrey, D-Minn., in sponsoring the resolution disapproving the proposed deferral of budget authority for the Indian Health facilities. The resolution requires only the action of the full Senate before the funds are freed for this construction season.

Gravel said, "This initial work must not be delayed, as the short construction season in Alaska dictates that, already, completion of this project is several years in the future."

The Alaska Democrat originally requested the funds for the replacement hospital for Bethel, to serve over 52 villages in the Yukon-Kuskokwim area of Alaska.

The Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Interior and Related Affairs acted favorably on Gravel's request and included a \$1.5 million appropriation in a bill which was passed into law in December.

One month later the President impounded those funds.

76 license plate deadline May 31

NOTICE OF UTILITY TARIFF FILING

The ALASKA PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION hereby gives notice that GENERAL TELEPHONE COMPANY OF ALASKA (GENTEL) has filed a tariff revision (TA-63) applicable to its exchanges at Annette, Haines, Metlakatla, Barrow, Bethel, McGrath, Unalakleet, Moose Pass, Seward, Wrangell, Petersburg, and Nome and consisting of proposed increases in its charges for telephone installations, instrument moves and changes and reconstructions. The present installation charges for business subscribers vary from \$5.00 to \$15.00 depending on the locality, and from \$5.00 to \$15.00 depending on the locality, and from \$5.00 to \$10.00 for residential subscribers. Gentel proposes to increase its business installation charges to \$50.00 in all of its exchanges and to increase its residential installation charges to \$30.00 in all exchanges. Installation charges for on-premise and off-premise extension telephones for business or residential service would increase to \$20.00 in each exchange location. The move and change charges would increase from \$5.00 at present in all exchanges (except Nome where the present charge is \$3.15) to \$20.00 for business service and \$15.00 for residential service. The business and residential reconection charges would increase from \$3.50 at present (Nome \$3.15) to \$15.00 in all exchanges.

Gravel to make three trips to Ak.

WASHINGTON - Sen. Mike Gravel, D-Alaska, plans to make three trips to Alaska this month to meet with the governor and his cabinet, address the State Legislature and speak at four Democratic party conventions.

Gravel plans to meet with Gov. Jay Hammond and members of his cabinet on March 12 regarding Gravel's proposal on the Devil Canyon hydroelectric project.

On Saturday, March 13, the Alaska lawmaker will be the banquet speaker at the Democratic convention in Fairbanks. He will fly to Anchorage Sunday afternoon to speak in the Anchorage Community College Sunday Recital Series on the Bicentennial.

The talk will be at 3 p.m. in the Anchorage Historical and Fine Arts Museum. He will meet with a hospital group before returning to Fairbanks that evening for a 10 p.m. flight to New York.

Gravel will be in New York Monday for meetings at the United Nations on the Law of the Sea Conference, returning to Washington the night of March 15. The following weekend, Gravel plans to return to Anchorage to be the banquet speaker at the Democratic Convention on Saturday, March 20.

The Alaska Democrat plans to leave Anchorage Sunday for San Francisco to address a convention on recycling.

He plans to return to Juneau the following Friday to speak to a joint session of the State Legislature. He will go to Wrangell that evening to speak on March 27 at the Democratic Convention there.

Gravel will leave Wrangell for Nome that day to speak on Sunday to the Northwest Democratic Convention in Nome. He will join in the celebration for the mushers in the Iditarod Race.

On Monday he will go to Kotzebue for a meeting of the NANA Regional Corporation before returning to Washington on Tuesday, March 30.
