KAHTAHAH Tells of Native Cultures

The minute details of day-today living in the carefully structured society of a Tlingit Indian Community, as observed and told by a precocious and perceptive Indian girl, is the newest book offering, KAHTAHAH, from Alaska Northwest Publishing

Company.
Written by Frances Lackey Written by Frances Lackey Paul, who taught Tlingit child-ren in a federal school in Southeastern Alaska early this century, KAHTAHAH deals with the practical use of myths and legends in the stylized culture of the Pacific Coast Native group, food gather ing, the relationship of clans, marriage arrangements and marriage arrangements and other elements that brought Tlingit society to a high point long before the intrusion of whites into the Indians' traditional homeland.

Illustrated by noted Alaskan artist Rie Munoz, the original manuscript for KAHTAHAH was prepared in 1938 while the memories of Kahtahah, a real person who died in her ninetieth year, were fresh. By that time, she had become known and loved throughout Southeastern Alaska, fulfilling the prophecy uttered by a shaman when she was a child.

Minor revisions to the original manuscript are included in the 110-page softbound book
