



ANCHORAGE, Ak.—Who's watching whom? This great snowy owl appears to be as interested in studying the research photographer as the researcher is in assessing the bird's habitat in the Brooks Range of mountains in Northern Alaska. Studies on the owl were a part of more than \$60 million worth of environmental and engineering studies devoted to the Arctic Gas pipeline proposal. Last March, Alaskan Arctic Gas and its sister company in Canada filed applications in both countries for permits to build a 2,600-mile, large-diameter, multi-billion dollar natural gas pipeline to tap prolific reserves on the North Slope of Alaska and Mackenzie River Delta area in Canada.

X-ray standards

The Federal Aviation Administration is planning to require that X-ray equipment used by foreign airlines to check passenger carry-on luggage at U.S. airports meet the same standards established for X-ray equipment used by U.S. airlines.

These standards include maximum radiation levels as set by the Food and Drug Administration, minimum performance and detecting capabilities as set by FAA, proper training of employees operating the equipment, and safeguards against the possible exposure of employees and others to excessive radiation. Also required would be the posting of signs advising passengers whether the particular X-ray machine in use will harm photographic film and which kinds it would affect.

The signs also must advise passengers that if they wish they can ask for and get a physical

inspection of their photographic equipment and film packages in lieu of the X-ray examination.

In an earlier action, the FAA required foreign airlines operating into the United States to use passenger screening procedures similar to those required of U.S. airlines.

This regulation, which went into effect on October 10, 1975, was imposed to safeguard the lives of Americans flying on foreign airlines and to insure that no unscreened passengers come into this country from foreign airports.

NOTICE OF UTILITY TARIFF FILING

The ALASKA PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION hereby gives notice that FORT YUKON UTILITIES, an electric utility, has filed a tariff revision (TAS-63) which makes provision for a delinquent fee of 10% to be added to all customers bills which are not paid within 20 days after the date of the bill. The revision also provides for disconnection of service after final notice and payment of a fee before service will be reconnected. The proposed rule is as follows:

"8.11 Delinquent Fee
Accounts are payable ten (10) days after receipt of statement, and are delinquent twenty (20) days after the date of the bill. A final notice demanding payment will be mailed to each delinquent account on the twentieth (20th) day after the billing date and if bill remains unpaid fifteen (15) days after the date of mailing the final notice, the Utilities may then disconnect the service and apply any deposits against the delinquent bill. If the account remains unpaid or partially paid after thirty (30) days of the original billing, a fee equal to ten percent (10%) of the billing will be added to the account. When service is disconnected for non-payment, it will be reconnected upon the consumer paying energy charges due, a ten dollar reconnect fee during working hours, a twenty-five \$25.00 dollar reconnect fee after working hours, plus the ten (10%) percent delinquent fee.

Any interested person may file with the Commission by 4:30 p.m., March 8, 1976, a statement of his views and specific reasons in favor of, or in opposition to, the tariff revision proposed by the utility together with written confirmation that the same statement also has been mailed or delivered to the utility.
