It has since been found, however, that Legislative Council hearings can only be held on pending legislation.

Most of the protests to the creation of a Native Affairs Department were that it would be discriminatory and set up a bureaucracy, similar to the Bureau of Indian Affairs, within the state government.

The bill will be presented through the rules committees of the two houses of the legislature at the request of the Governor.

probably in early April.

The governor's plan would grant title to villages for lands needed now and in the future, would provide compensation for other valid claims, and would provide economic development to ease unemployment in the villages.

Surface and mineral rights to the land occupied by the villages, including room for expansion, would be given to the villages. The title could be held by the village as a whole or by the individual residents.

Surface rights would be given for the surrounding areas which are used to support the villages. This "ecological belt" would have to be determined for each village and might vary widely; Sam Taalak of the Arctic Slope Native Association reported "we need 96 million acres for caribou ranching."

All compensation for other lands on which claims were valid would go into a trust fund to be administered for the good of all Natives in Alaska. Hickel said that the trustees would be chosen by the Natives.
