# Earthquake Pamphlet

Senator Ted Stevens' Anchorage Office has available for the asking a new government pamphlet "Safety and Survival in an Earthquake.'

Prepared by the U.S. Department of the Interior, Geological Survey, and the Office of Emergency Preparedness, the pamphlet gives several valuable tips on earthquake survival.

Although the supply of the pamphlet is limited at the moment, Senator Stevens said he has requested a government reprint and should have a copy for everyone asking for one within three or four weeks.

In the meantime, copies will be available for the first two hundred persons who visit or write requesting them.

## **WOULD INCREASE GOLD OUTPUT**

Senator Ted Stevens has cosponsored a bill (S.1826) designed to increase the annual production of gold in the United States.

Stevens said the bill's purpose was twofold. First, it would help rehabilitate the gold mining industry, and, secondly, it would allow the United States to build up its stockpile of gold.

The bill provides for Federal financial incentives to domestic gold producers to induce increased annual production and to show the relationship of gold to the internal affairs of the United States.

Stevens said, "A Bureau of Mines report published in 1967 estimated that our known gold ore reserves in this country are approximately 400 million ounces, only 9 million ounces of which are mineable at the \$35 an ounce price."

The legislation Stevens has co-sponsored would authorize the Administrator of General Services to contract for newly mined domestic gold produced within the United States at not less than \$45 per ounce nor more than \$75 per ounce for the purpose of establishing a strategic

and critical stockpile of gold in the amount of 20 mill ounces to be earmarked for space and defense needs or other national emergency requirements.

### CONFERENCE

Kimball, member of the Quorum of Twelve; The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter day Saints.
