This project consists of constructing a highway rest area located adjacent to the Alaska Highway, Milepost 1250, approximately 13.5 miles southeast of Northway Junction, State of Alaska.

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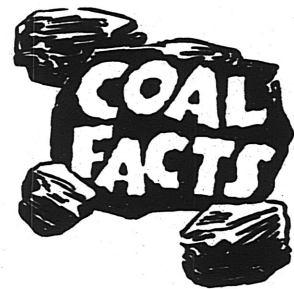
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
