

## ANCSA staff expands

(Reprinted from "The Land," the BLM Newsletter).

A major shift in personnel and workload by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) will increase its capacity to process land applications filed under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act.

"A recent look at our workload and staffing in the Native claims program suggested some changes would be advantageous," said BLM State Director Curtis V. McVee, "and the adjustments were made to speed up the conveyance of land to Alaska Natives."

McVee went on to say that most of the new positions will be filled by staffing reductions in other programs to allow more concentration on processing Native claims applications.

The Branch of Lands and Minerals Operations in the BLM State Office has increased its professional staff working on Native claims by 16 to 18 persons, an increase of some 42 per cent.

This includes a five-person team working exclusively on the Cook Inlet Region selections. The clerical staff supporting the Native claims work has increased 16 per cent.

Three persons have also been added to the staff working on easements across Native lands including two persons in the Division of Resources and one in the Branch of Photogrammetry.

In addition to the state office personnel shifts, the Anchorage district office is gearing up for a team to work only on the Calista region selections.

All work on Native claims had previously been done in the state office.

Sealed bids in single copy for furnishing all labor, materials and equipment, and performing all work on Project OS-2(002), Cantwell Spur Road described herein, will be received until 2:00 p.m. prevailing time, July 1, 1976 in the Commissioner's Office, Department of Highways, Island Center Building, Douglas, Alaska.

This project will consist of grading and asphalt surfacing on 1.9 miles of off-system roadway located near Cantwell, Alaska. Included in the work will be a 180-foot bridge across the Jack River.

Principal items of work consist of the following: 17,000 tons of Borrow; 9,750 tons of Crushed Aggregate Base; 22 tons of MC-30 for Prime; 500 tons of Class I Riprap; 375 linear feet of Beam Type Guard Rail; Alternative "A": 70 tons of RC-800 for Asphalt Surface Treatment; 765 tons of Cover Coat Aggregate, Grading "C" and "E"; approximately 9,400 pounds of Structural Steel, lump sum, all required; 660 linear feet of Structural Steel Piles; approximately 104 MBM Treated Timber, lump sum, all required; 38 linear feet of Metal Bridge Railing; Alternative "B": 2,200 tons of Hot Asphalt Pavement; 140 tons of Asphalt Cement AR-20; 12-inch Prestressed Concrete Members (60' Bulb-T); Prestressed Concrete Abutment and 6,900 pounds of Structural Steel Piles; and 304 linear feet of Metal Bridge Railing.

All work shall be completed in 180 Calendar days.

In accordance with requirements set forth by the "Federal Highway Administration," the following provisions are made a part of all advertisements for highway construction contracts:

"Bidders must submit certifications stating whether or not they intend to subcontract a portion of the work and, if so, that they have taken affirmative action to seek out and consider minority business enterprises as potential subcontractors. Each bidder intending to subcontract a portion of the contract work shall make contact with potential minority business enterprises and subcontractors to affirmatively solicit their interest, capability and prices, and shall document the results to such contacts. A bidder's failure to submit this certification or submission of a false certification shall render his bid nonresponsive."

Certification form (14-60) and a Directory of Minority Business Enterprises will be included with the bidding documents.

Plans and specifications may be obtained by all who have a bona fide need for them for bidding purposes from the Chief Road Design Engineer, P. O. ## Regional council nominees names submitted

Governor Jay Hammond today announced that he has submitted to Secretary of Commerce Elliot Richardson a list of 18 nominees for the North Pacific Fisheries Management Council created by the extended fisheries jurisdiction legislation recently enacted by Congress.

The governor said he was required by the Act to submit a list of not less than 15 nominees prior to May 28, from which Secretary Richardson must appoint five Alaskans to the Council by August 11.

Hammond commented that he expects the secretary to move rapidly in making the

appointments due to the urgency of establishing the Council.

"I recognize full well," the governor said, "with only five available seats it will be impossible to satisfy all interests on this council. However, I have taken personal care to select the nominees from almost a hundred suggestions submitted to my office by taking into account geographical area, fisheries involved, ethnic heritage, and background in commercial fishing, processing, recreational fishing, commercial fisheries management, international relations, and consumer usage.

In my opinion, as difficult as it was, the selection as offered to Secretary Richardson is the best mix for the welfare of the marine resources involved and for all Alaskans."

## New border station at Canada border

WASHINGTON—The full Senate Public Works Committee has approved plans for a new border station at the U.S. Canadian border, 42 miles from Haines.

Sen. Mike Gravel, D-Alaska, a member of the committee, requested the new station at the border to assure adequate control of border crossings. It will replace station facilities at Haines.

Funds have been included in the General Services Administration Budget for the construction, estimated to cost \$2,723,000.

The prospectus now needs only the approval of the House Public Works Committee for work to begin.

The new facility would consist of a station building, a garage and service building and three employee residences, providing a total of 10,680 square feet of occupiable space.

The Department of Highways proposes the reconstruction of a 68 mile section of the Alaska Highway from the Tanana River at MP 1303 to MP 1235.

In compliance with Title 23, U.S. Code, an opportunity for a Corridor and Design Public Hearing for the Alaska Highway, Tanana River to MP 1235 Project (RF-062-1(14)) is being offered at this time.
