"Those of you who live in isolated villages will probably be involved in as much social ser-vice work as law enforcement,"

Henri said.
"This will include such a wide range of items as youth counseling, counseling the village councils in respect to justice, handcits in respect to justice, nand-ling difficulties involving liquor, first aid work, rescues, and the many problems which arise of a similar nature."

The Commissioner of Administration pointed out that the state was happy to partake in programs where the people of the villages learn to administer

their own problems.

Subjects studied by the trainees included: Police terminology, police patroling, criminal law, searching and handcuffing of prisoners, identification of drugs, safety, swimming, hand-ling of misdemeanor and felony complaints, fingerprinting, court-room testimony, interviews, and first aid.
