

### Ski Boot Hill Free Lessons For Children

Free ski lessons for elementary school children are now being held at Ski Boot Hill on Saturdays at 11:30 A.M. These lessons are being made available through the Fairbanks City Recreation Department.

Children must provide their own ski equipment or rent equipment at Ski Boot Hill. All children will be taught how to ride the rope tow in the first lesson. The rope tow fee is \$1.50 for children for all day.

There is a ski bus running Saturdays that anyone may ride. The bus may be caught at Denali School at 10:30 A.M., at Barnette School at 10:35, at Hunter School at 10:40, and at Pay-N-Save at 10:50 A.M.

The bus leaves Ski Boot Hill at 4:00 P.M., and stops at the same places as mentioned above. Round trip bus fare is \$5.50.

A ski race will be held this Saturday, Feb. 27th, at Ski Boot Hill for elementary age children. The entry fee is \$25. To race a child does not have to be an expert skier.

The Ski Patrol at Ski Boot Hill requests that all parents make certain that their children have run-a-way safety straps on their skis.

## Agreement Signed T-H Take Over of Programs

An agreement that allows the Tlingit and Haida Central Council to take over Bureau of Indian Affairs programs covering Tlingit and Haida people has been signed, U.S. Sen. Ted Stevens said.

The BIA-Tlingit and Haida pact covers all BIA programs in areas such as welfare, education, roads and land management. Only exception to the agreement is the program covering Annette Island reservation.

Sen. Stevens said the pact

will allow the Tlingit and Haida council to determine its own destiny through being involved in the formulation, conduct and administration of its BIA programs.

The contract was signed in Washington, D.C. Signing it were John Borbridge, Jr., president of the Central Council, and Alexander S. MacNabb, director of operating services for the BIA.

### Decreased Subsidy on Air Carriers

A decrease in federal subsidy payments to Alaska air carriers has been announced by the Civil Aeronautics Board, U.S. Sen. Ted Stevens said.

In fiscal 1970, subsidy payments of \$4,790,000 were made to four air carriers—Alaska Airlines, Kodiak Airlines, Western Airlines and Wien Consolidated Airlines.

### \$10,000 Earmarked

An estimated \$10,000 is earmarked for Equal Employment Opportunity Commission work in Alaska next year, Sen. Ted Stevens reports.

Alaska's senior senator said the estimate was made by the EEOC in Washington.

The commission's job is to eliminate discrimination in employment.

During this fiscal year (1971) the total is expected to be \$4,313,000, Senator Stevens said. The CAB estimates that the next fiscal year's figure will be \$4,467,000.

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
