NOTICE OF PROPOSED ADOPTION OF REGULATIONS BY THE ALASKA PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION

Notice is hereby given that the ALASKA PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION (APUC) under authority vested by AS 42.05.151(a) proposes to adopt regulations adding a new section 200 to Chapter 52 of Title 3 of the Alaska Administrative Code to implement, interpret and make specific AS 42.05.431 as follows:

1. Requires commission approval before a municipal utility regulated by the APUC may issue revenue bonds and certification by the commission that the proposed bond issue complies with applicable statutes and regulations.
2. Prescribes information the regulated municipal utility shall submit to the commission when requesting approval for the revenue bond issue.
3. Specifies that the issuing municipal utility bear the burden of proving that the terms and conditions of the proposed bond issue are reasonable and that the rate of return required by the coverage covenants will be just, reasonable and will not result in an unreasonable rates or charges to be paid by the consumer.
4. Prescribes the criteria to be applied by the commission in approving or disapproving the proposed revenue bond issues.

Notice is also given that any interested person may submit written statements or present oral statements or arguments relevant to the proposed regulation at a hearing to be held at 9:30 A.M., Monday, December 13, 1976, at the Commission offices, 1100 MacKay Building, 338 Denali Street, Anchorage, Alaska. On that date or thereafter, the commission may adopt, either upon its own motion or at the instance of an interested person, the above proposal as a permanent regulation substantially as set out above without further notice.

This project will consist of grading, drainage, asphalt surface treatment, telephone line adjustment and construction of an 89' long prestressed concrete girder bridge over Mendeltna Creek. The project is located on the Glenn Highway, 141 miles northeasterly of Anchorage, Alaska.

Principal items of work consist of the following: 147 acres of clearing and grubbing; 877,000 cubic yards of unclassified excavation; 100,000 tons of borrow and 490,000 tons of selected material; 370,000 cubic yard miles of haul and 665,000 ton miles of haul; 2,000 cubic yards of structure excavation; 92,000 tons of aggregate base, grading "D"; 218 tons of MC-30 for prime; 1,000 tons of CR-52 for surface treatment; 5,000 tons of grading "B" cover coat and 3,000 tons of grading "E" cover coat; 2,900 linear feet of 24" pipe conduit and 1,300 linear feet of 36" pipe conduit; 6 each (89' Build-T) prestressed concrete structural members; 2 each, prestressed concrete abutments; 549 linear feet of structural steel piles, furnished and driven; painted traffic markings and telephone line relocation, and miscellaneous items of work.
