# Kaktovik hearing sparks diverse **ANWR** statements

KAKTOVIK - Several plane leads of visitors arrived. from far away places under fairly clear skies and relatively warm weather here Tuesday to discuss the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

Villagers generously provided an ample potlack dinner in the high school gyms for their guests, including some highly prized mulctuk and whale meat,

Later, more than 100 visitors and villagers gathered in a newly finished community ball for the second of three hearings conducted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, concerning oil and gas leasing within the refuge.

This North Slope village, population 207, is on Barter Island at the edge of the Beaufort Sea. The village, the most eastern in the North Slope Borough, is about 400 miles north of Fairbanks and 300 miles east of Barrow

Just south of here, in an area about 104 miles long and varying from 16 to 34 miles wide, are 1.55 million acres of land in which the Fish and Wildlife Service says there might be vast accumulations of oil.

# Whaling commission favors amendments

The Alaska Eskimo Whaling Commission favors a set of amendments to the Marine Mammal Protection Act and the Endangered Species Act signed into law recently by President Reagan.

Officials of the commission said they were involved in the drafting of the amendments, and they believe the changes represent a reasonable compromise between the subsistence interests of villages and the development in-

terests of the energy corporations. In a prepared press release from the commission, they also said the amendments strengthen the Marine Mammal Protection Act protections for the subsistence hunt of bowhead whales.
