KUAC Spots VISTA's for Week's Feature

This week, KUAC-FM's "Special of the Week" features an in depth discussion with three former VISTA Volunteers (Volunteers in Service to America) who served in Alaska and now attend the university and one VISTA currently serving in the state.

Students Mary Coner (Hooper Bay), Pat Fitzgerald (Arctic Village and Kivalina), and Jim Wright (Koyukuk) join VISTA Jannik Von Rosenvinge, now serving in Arctic Village, and comment on their projects in Alaska's remote native villages, their frustrations and problems, and reflect on what the entire VISTA experience meant.

Their remarks will provide listeners with a more meaningful and informative insight into the VISTA program in Alaska.

Moderator of the program is KUAC-FM's program director, Jim Ludwig, who served as a VISTA volunteer on the Blackfeet Indian reservation in Montana. The program will be aired Sunday, October 27th, at 1:00 p.m.

Next week, Ludwig joins Von Rosenvinge in Arctic Village, furthest north Indian community, to produce a special documentary program for KUAC-FM on the village life and people.

Accompanying Ludwig will be Spencer Linderman wildlife graduate student, who will photograph the arctic adventure. This isolated community of 75 is typical of many Alaskan villages for it has no electricity, running water, or major transportation facilities except dog-sled and three skimo-bikes.


