

Hospital Staffing Study Group Meets

The Staffing Study group of the Greater Fairbanks Hospital Association met for the first time at the home of Doctor J.A. Worrall, Saturday, December 30, 1967. After selecting a permanent chairman, the group developed a plan of action to be followed in order to complete its task by the assigned date of January 20, 1968.

A survey form will be published in the Fairbanks newspapers. The purpose of this form is to enable the committee to determine the community's hospital staff potential—exclusive physicians.

The committee hopes that everyone with training or experience in hospital work will fill out the form and send it in. A follow-up questionnaire will be used to clarify certain areas, but initially the information requested in the form will be sufficient.

This information will provide a basis for establishing the staffing potential for the hospital that is to be built. Once again, the committee urges everyone with hospital training or experience to complete the form and send it in.

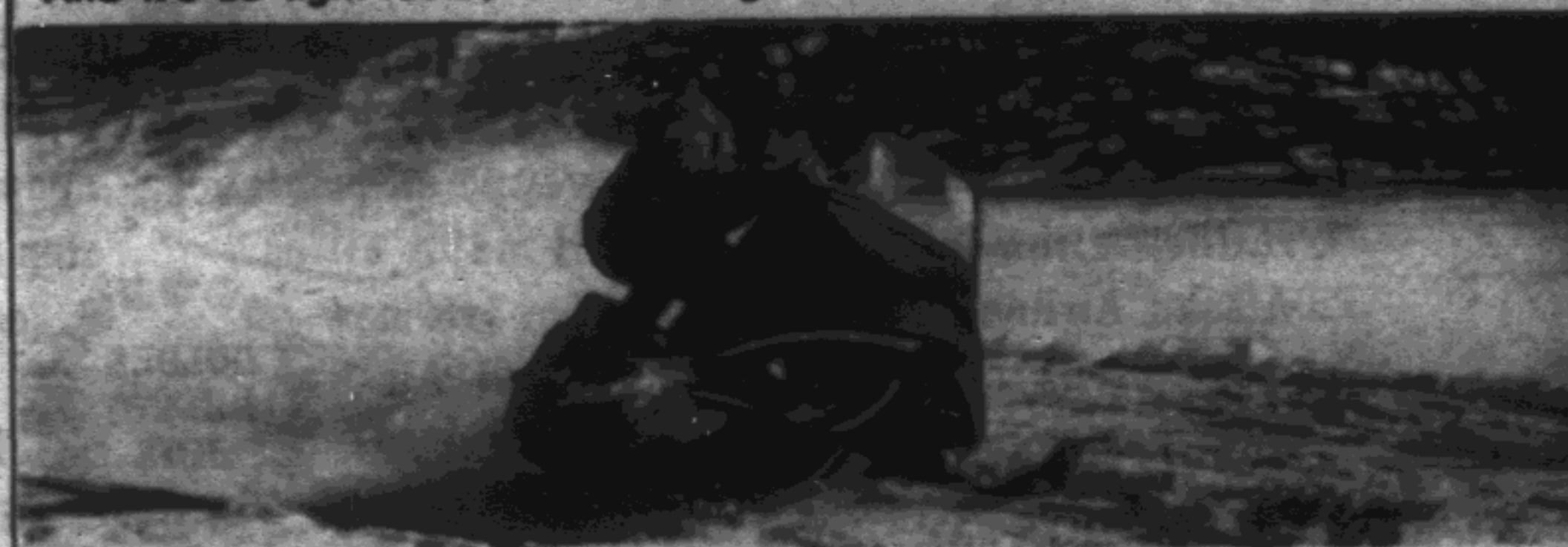
