The Advisory Board made the following recommendations:

by ASCAP can be realized by the local residents.

2) Listing of programs and the proper people to contact con cerning those programs in the Action Reports. The Action Reports is the weekly publication of ASCAP for the information and education of all Alaskans within the area served by ASCAP.

3) Make sure that the Interior Target Area Advisory Board and the programs it recommends are on Action Reports.

4) That community centers be establishedin villages as soon as possible.

Although the above matter was discussed at important lengths, the State Senate Bill 376 took up considerable part of the Nenana meeting.

After discussion of the bill, Robert F. Mott, advisory board member from Fort Yukon, made a motion that the board opposes Governor Walter J. Hickel and the bill for the intent that the State take over ASCAP.

The motion was seconded by Harry Kaleak of Barrow and it carried unanimously.

A telegram voicing opposition to the bill was drawn up and sent to Senator Elton Engstrom of Juneau, chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee.

Opposition to SB 376

Engstrom held a Senator public hearing to get a reading on the feelings of the Alaska citizens.

ASCAP executive director Larry Brayton told the committee at the hearing that he feared "the present good cooperation of the target area people would be eliminated if the people lost the concept of helping themselves and began to see Community Action as an official, formal agency, like the Bureau of Indian Affairs or the Department of Welfare."

Brayton said in Juneau that Community Action works in Alaska because it really can be action by, of, and for the villages.

"We cannot go in and throw programs to the villagers. We know that the plans and ideas THEY want to develop are the ones that will surin the end," he said.

Ten Villages Form Joint Corporation


