AFN Charitable Trust Seeks Funds

The Alaska Federation of Natives Charitable Trust is seeking foundation money to help strengthen 12 regional offices. Emil Notti, chairman of the trust board, reports they are

currently working with a \$137,000 Ford Foundation grant to project the economic future of the organization.

Through this grant, Roy Ewan and Juanita Corwin were hired in May to train with Robert Nathan and Associates, economic consultants in Washington, D.C.

They have completed six weeks training there and are currently working on a board review of social and economic developments. Next their task will be to shape up the 12 proposed regions and help acquire full time staffing for them.

The Nathan organization sent a survey team to the state in April and May and their report

"ANAC is the registered trademark for the Alaskan Native Arts and Crafts, a cooperative association, incorporated and owned by the Eskimo and Indian Craftsmen for the procurement, warehousing and marketing of their MADE IN ALASKA arts and crafts products. The ANAC mark of authenticity shows the Eskimo hunter in his kayak superimposed across the totemic eye design of the Tlingit Indian of Southeastern Alaska."
