# GI Bill Benefits to end in January

The nation's third GI Bill,  
which has provided educational  
assistance for 6.6 million veter-  
ans and active-duty members  
with military service since Feb.  
1, 1955, will not be avail-  
able for persons entering the  
armed forces after Dec. 31,  
1976.

The Veterans Education and  
Employment Assistance Act of  
1976 (PL 94-502), signed into  
law by President Ford Oct. 15,  
set the termination date for the  
GI Bill eligibility. It also design-  
ated Dec. 31, 1989, as the  
closing date for all training for  
those already eligible under this  
program.

Offsetting the end of GI Bill  
eligibility, the new law created a  
voluntary contributory educa-  
tional assistance program for  
persons initially entering  
military service after Dec. 31,

1976. Jointly operated by the  
Veterans Administration and the  
Department of Defense, the  
program will offer 36 months  
educational assistance entitle-  
ment, with a 10-year delimiting  
date.

Participants in the new pro-  
gram may contribute \$50 to  
\$75 monthly from their salaries,  
up to a maximum \$2,700. The  
contributions will be matched  
by the VA at the rate of \$2  
for every \$1 made by the service  
member.

The new law also provided  
for an 8 per cent increase in  
monthly allowances for all  
current training offered by the  
GI Bill, except flight training,  
retroactive to Oct. 1. The  
basis entitlement for trainees  
was extended from 36 to 45  
months.

Prepayment of the monthly  
allowance was eliminated, effec-  
tive June 1, 1977. Also, after  
June 1, advance payment at the  
start of training will be per-  
mitted only at the request of the  
trainee and provided the school  
agrees to comply with the  
requirements of the law.

reenrollments by current active-  
duty members in predischage  
education program (PREP) after  
Oct. 31, 1976. PREP will be  
available during last six months  
of first enlistment for service  
members who participate in new  
voluntary contributory education  
program.

\*Removed delimiting date for  
seriously disabled and blinded  
veterans enrolled in vocational  
rehabilitation training.

\*Prohibits an attorney-in-fact  
from negotiating benefit check  
as such action is considered as  
assignment.

The current GI Bill was  
effective June 1, 1966, providing  
educational assistance for eli-  
gible veterans who served on  
active duty after Jan. 31, 1955.  
When all training under the bill  
has been terminated, its 23-1/2-  
year lifespan will have almost  
doubled that of each of its  
predecessors.

The World War II GI Bill  
ended July 25, 1956, after 12  
years. Lifetime of the Korean  
Conflict GI Bill was 12-1/2 years,  
ending Jan. 31, 1965.

minimal standards for efficient  
operation.

6. prior to the involvement of  
out-of-community persons in the  
design of new facilities, local  
residents and school staff will be  
afforded an opportunity to present  
ideas and recommendations that will  
be followed in the design and  
construction of new schools. The  
State Department of Education will  
facilitate the transfer of  
responsibility for design and construc-  
tion—of such facilities from  
various State agencies to local school  
districts.

7. and further, that a percentage  
shall be set aside from all  
construction funds to seek and imple-  
ment the recommendations of local  
people in design of new facilities.  
It is felt that buildings should reflect  
community and educational needs,  
not the reverse.
