

# All Fourth Class Cities Also Eligible for Revenue Sharing

Local governments are eligible to receive state money in exchange for services they provide such as road maintenance (\$1500 per mile), land use planning (\$2 per capita), and parks and recreation (\$5 per capita).

As of mid-September, most rural communities had not applied for these funds, according to the State Division of Budget and Management.

Applications for the program,

known as the State Revenue Sharing Program, should be mailed to the Division of Budget and Management, Department of Administration, Juneau, Alaska 99801.

If a community did not receive an application, it should request one from the above address.

All fourth class cities are entitled to at least that portion of the revenue sharing based on

parks and recreation (\$5 per capita) as a result of a bill passed

in the last legislative session giving fourth class cities the legal

authority to provide parks and recreation.

# COMPARE YOUR VOTE WITH YOUR SENATOR'S

When you enter the voting booth on Nov. 3 to elect a United States Senator, you will want to choose a man who speaks for YOU, who represents YOUR point of view.

You know where Wendell Kay stands on all the issues, housing, education, the economy, crime control, the Native Land Claims and the Pipeline because Wendell Kay has spoken on the issues every day of his campaign. To know where Wendell Kay stands, all you have to do is ask. We think you also have the right to know how Ted Stevens has voted on issues affecting you. LET'S LOOK AT THE RECORD, THE CONGRESSIONAL RECORD:

### YOUR SENATOR VOTED "NO"

1. To exempt education and health programs from fiscal 1970 ceilings. (HR 11400, June 18, 1969.)
2. To increase funds for National Defense Act Loans, Educational Opportunity Grants, and College Work-Study programs. (S 2721, August 12, 1969)
3. To increase funds for urban renewal from \$1 billion to \$1.5 billion in fiscal 1970. (HR 12307, November 10, 1969) The vote on that proposal was 34-36. Had Ted Stevens voted for urban renewal the vote would have been a tie.
4. To provide \$22 million in poverty funds for education in family planning. (HR 13111, January 21, 1970)
5. To establish a special Division of Organized Crime in the Department of Justice. (S 30, January 22, 1970)
6. To limit to \$20,000 each year what the federal Government can pay a rich farmer NOT to grow food. (HR 11612, July 7, 1969)
7. To permit Social Security benefits to begin at age 60 rather than 62. (HR 13270, December 5, 1969)
8. To place reasonable limits on campaign expenditures. (S 36-37, April 14, 1970)
9. To stop the selling of arms of the Greek Military Dictatorship. (HR 15628, June 19, 1970)
10. To halt expenditures on the extravagant C 5A pending an audit by the Comptroller General. (S 2546, July 9, 1969)

### BUT HE VOTED "YES":

1. To prohibit the use of federal funds for construction of airport passenger and air freight terminals. (HR 14465, February 26, 1970)
2. To re-commit and thereby kill the Food Stamp Extension Bill for fiscal 1970 (S 2547, September 24, 1969)
3. To confirm G. Harold Carswell to the United States Supreme Court (April 8, 1970)
4. To allow banks to require "prior dealings" with a student or his family in order to qualify for low interest loans for education. (S 2721, August 12, 1969) Stevens and 20 other Senators voted for the bankers. 72 Senators voted for the students.
5. To place new limitations on appropriations for school lunch programs (S 2548, February 23, 1970)
6. To cut Labor-Health, Education and Welfare expenditures by almost \$1 billion. (HR 15931, February 27, 1970)
7. To deploy the ABM system. (HR 17123, August 12, 1970) Bob Bartlett was one of 34 courageous Senators to vote against ABM deployment under the Johnson Administration.
8. To cripple the Cooper-Church Amendment with at least 6 amendments during the month of June, 1970.

Wendell Kay says, "I want this election to be decided on issues, not personalities. I have tried to present my views to you. I have challenged Ted Stevens to debate his own views. When he refused, I instructed my staff to research the Stevens voting record and to show you areas where we are in disagreement. These ads are the work of the Wendell Kay staff, not some phony committee that hides behind a false name. I also instructed my staff to begin running these ads at least 10 days before the Nov. 3 election in order to give Mr. Stevens ample opportunity to reply. I urge you, the voters of Alaska to vote for the candidate of your choice on Nov. 3. But, please, try to know where your candidate stands.
