Disenrollment procedural rules published

enrollment of persons erroneous-ly included on the roll of per-sons eligible for benefits under the Alaska Native Claims Settle-ment Act are being published in the Federal Register, the Department of the Interior announced recently.

A roll of eligible Alaska Natives was conditionally approved Dec. 17, 1973, and legislation enacted Jan. 2, 1976, reopened enrollment process another full year.

The disenrollment regulations establish procedures for removing, with due process, persons not entitled to the benefits of the Act.

\$2,482,000 disaster loan for **Bethel Utilities**

WASHINGTON Small Business Administration recently approved a \$2,482,000 disaster loan for Bethel Utilities to replace equipment destroyed when the power plant blew up last December.

Sen. Mike Gravel, D-Alaska, in a telegram to SBA Administrator Mitchell P. Kobelinski, had urged that the loan application be expedited so equipment orders could be placed to be shipped by barge to Bethel after break-up. Gravel pointed out that unless the orders could be placed immediately the equipment "cannot make the shipment deadline and would have to be airfreighted to Bethel at a much higher cost."

President Ford declared Bethel a disaster area after the loss of the power plant to an explosion and fire on Dec. 2. The City of Bethel was without electricity for 50 hours until two turbines were provided for temporary use. The Air Force has since been operate. Air Force has since been operatgenerators providing elec-ty until Bethel Utilities is back in operation.

SBA has a \$500,000 limitation for disaster loans that can be made without the admin-istrator's approval. The loan can cover only the replacement cost of equipment lost in a disaster, the SBA advised Gravel.

Gravel had urged the President to declare Bethel a disaster area so that federal assistance could be made available. The senator said he was "pleased that help is now on the way."

Persons on the roll share ownership, through stock hold-ings in their regional and vil-lage corporations, of 40 million acres of land and cash distributions, to be made over a period of years, of \$962.5 million.

The rules provide time limits

for contesting any enrollment. For persons on the conditionally approved roll of Dec. 17, 1973, no contest may be initi-

ated after July 31, 1977; for those enrolled under the Jan. 2, 1976 legislation no contest may be initiated after may 2, 1978.

Disenrollment under Disenfollment under the rules, which become effective 30 days after publication, will not retroactively affect land entitlements of any Alaska Native group or past fund distributions made under the Act.
