As for the missing Field Committee, it died for lack of federal funding. At last report Sen. Mike Gravel was "rescuing the Alaska Field Committee from extinction at the hands of the Nixon Administration."

had introduced an amendment authorizing \$500,000 over the next two years to continue the committee's work. The amendment is attached to a bill extending the Public Works and Eco nomic Development Act of 1965
